section of the border country in which federal forces are still loyal to Madero, are taken to indicate that there will be no immediate increase of the American patrol force along the Texas-Mexican frontier.

Catrons Advocate Intervention.

The Mexican situation was the subject of animated discussion among senators today, particularly those from border states. Senator Catron of New Mexico, in an interview said:

"There is only one thing to do. That is for this government to go into Mexico and handle the situation there as it did in Cuba."

"I am not in the least surprised at the report of the uprising against President Madero," said Senator William Alden Smith, chairman of the senate committee, investigating conditions on the border.

"I have been astonished that the break has not come sooner."

A resolution calling for the safeguarding of American interests in Mexico also was introduced in the senate by Senator Martins of New Jersey. It was identical with that introduced in the house by Representative Hammell.

American Officials Reported Shot.

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 10.—District Attorney John D. Fredericks said today that Roy E. Rankin, who was perhaps fatally shot at Tijuana, Lower California, early yesterday, and Guy L. Rockwell, his companion, both of whom are held by Mexican authorities, were attaches of the investigating department of the Los Angeles district attorney's office and were in Tijuana on official business. He declined to tell what these men were working on or to say why attaches of Los Angeles county should be working on investigations involving a visit to a foreign country.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Feb. 10.—An investigation of the shooting of Roy E. Rankin at Tijuana, Lower California, by a Mexican volunteer soldier, was begun today by Mexican authorities. The soldier, Jose Marcia, is under arrest.

According to Mexican Consul Gomez in San Diego, Rankin and G. L. Rockwell played pool with the sub-perfecto in Tijuana Sunday night and were on their way to their hotel when ordered to halt by a sentry. Rockwell answered the sentry in Spanish, saw him throw up his rifle and stepped aside. The bullet struck Rankin in the right shoulder, passing through his lungs. The consul stated he was under the impression the shooting occurred on American territory.

Superior Man Dead.

BOONE, Ia., Feb. 10.—(Special Telegram.)—A message this morning from Los Angeles brings information of the death of F. M. Johnston, of Superior, Neb., formerly a pioneer resident of Boone. Death came suddenly Saturday at the residence of Lefe Zimbleman. Interment will be in Superior.

BATTLE IN WEST VIRGINIA MONTENEGRINS TAKE HILL

Pose and Miners Clash on Mountain Near Mucklow. THREE OFFICERS ARE KILLED

Loss Among Miners Had Not Been Ascertained When Courier Left—Telegraph Wires Cut—Fight Still in Progress.

CHARLESTON, W. Va., Feb. 10.—Three men were killed in a fight between striking miners and a posse under Captain Fred Lester on the mountain near Mucklow today. The dead men were members of Lester's force. The fight was still on early this afternoon.

The dead: FRANK BOBBETT, bookkeeper at Mucklow mine of the Paint Creek Collieries company. RALPH LIPP. VANCE. The wounded: Nesbitt.

Captain Lester, an officer of the West Virginia National guard, who has been employed by the Paint Creek Collieries company to command its mine guards, learned today that a force of striking miners and their sympathizers were marching toward Mucklow to attack the force of deputies under Sheriff Bonner Hill, stationed at that place.

Fight on Mountain Top. Lester gathered his forces and, marching over the mountain, came across the miners near the summit of the ridge. A sharp engagement followed in which the miners are said to have fought desperately. It is not known how many of them were killed or injured.

Captain Lester's men held their ground and when the news of the battle came out of the strike country the fight was still in progress.

Governor Glasscock is expected to call out the National guard this afternoon. The scene of the fighting is far up in the mountains. Governor Glasscock and Governor-elect Hatfield have determined to arrest the men who, it is alleged, have been directing the revolutionary operations in the Cabin Creek and Paint Creek sections of the Kanawha coal fields of Charleston.

Spies at Capital. It has been learned the striking miners and their sympathizers have been receiving information from what appeared to be confidential sources in the capital itself; that they have been supplied with money, arms and ammunition, and were warned to return into the mountains when any show of force was made.

While there is no disposition to view the situation in the coal field hysterically, the military and civil authorities are convinced that it is grave, and the wires at Mucklow having been cut, the news was taken by courier on horseback to a telephone station ten miles away and telephoned to Charleston.

The code commission also bounds Scott's Bluff county on one side with Cheyenne county, which is wrong because Morrill county is now a boundary of Scott's Bluff and Cheyenne does not touch it.

Three Men Bound Over.

BEATRICE, Neb., Feb. 10.—(Special Telegram.)—Richards Tavern, Mike Welch and Pat Hogan were given their preliminary hearing today on the charge of robbing J. B. Parker's harness store in this city last week of \$23 worth of fur overcoats. They were bound over to the district court in bonds of \$50 each, in default of which they were remanded to jail.

Turks Are Driven From Fort Commanding Scutari.

LOSS OF LIFE IS ENORMOUS Four Thousand Turks and 2,500 Montenegrins Killed or Wounded—Turks Are Defeated at Sulair.

PODGORITZA, Montenegro, Feb. 10.—The Montenegrin army besieging the Turkish fortress of Scutari carried the great Bardanjoli hill by assault at 10:30 o'clock this morning after several hours of severe fighting.

The infantry on several occasions came into such close quarters that hand-to-hand fighting was general along the line.

Bardanjoli hill dominates Scutari from the eastern side and the Montenegrins are mounting siege guns on heights to bombard the principal points of the city.

Fighting has gone on since early morning all around the city. The Turkish defenders are disputing the ground with fierce determination.

Losses Sixty-Five Hundred. CETTINJE, Montenegro, Feb. 10.—The capture of Bardanjoli hill at Scutari by the Montenegrins cost the victors 3,500 men in killed and wounded.

The Turks left 4,000 men, dead and wounded on the field of battle.

This heavy price paid by the victors and the defenders at Bardanjoli was made known in messages received today from the front.

A Montenegrin attack on the heights of Terabosch, which dominates Scutari on the west, has been going on for three days. This onslaught is believed to have been as sanguinary as the engagement at Bardanjoli.

Turks Defeated at Sulair. SOFIA, Feb. 10.—The rout of the Turkish army before Sulair on Saturday is said here to have been complete. The Turks are reported to have suffered enormous losses.

The field of battle was littered with flags, field guns, machine guns and rifles left in flight by the panic stricken Ottoman troops.

The Turkish dead and wounded were lying thickly everywhere. Twenty officers were among the killed.

The number of men killed among the Bulgarians is not yet known, but it appears to have been insignificant.

Attorney May Be Declared Fugitive from Justice

SIOUX FALLS, S. D., Feb. 10.—(Special.)—It is expected that within a few days Warren Alden Lord, one of the wealthiest residents of the city and manager of what are known as the Temple Court properties, situated near the heart of the business district, which belong to the Lord estate, will be placed in the county jail to serve a term of thirty days. The charge upon which he was convicted was conducting a disorderly house and grew out of a sensational episode in which some young girls figured.

Lord was originally fined \$100, but took an appeal, with the result that the prison term of thirty days was added to the fine. He then carried the case to the state supreme court, which affirmed the judgment in the case. The supreme court recently denied him a rehearing, and as the papers in the case now have been forwarded here from the supreme court a commitment will be issued, and if Lord fails to put in an appearance he will forfeit his bond of \$1,000 and be declared a fugitive from justice. Lord departed a few days ago with his mother for a visit at their former home in Boston, Mass.

Lord's attorneys in Sioux Falls have asked that the issuance of the commitment be postponed for a few days in order to give the defendant time to return from the east. This is taken to indicate that he will return and commence serving his jail sentence.

NINE WOMEN ESCAPE FROM KANSAS REFORMATORY

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Feb. 10.—Nine negro women escaped from the woman's reformatory here last night after overpowering H. C. Boyd, the night watchman, and threatening him with his own revolver.

The escape, which had been carefully planned, was made when the watchman went to the cell room to lock up for the night. Four of the women, who had hidden in the corridor, rushed at him and threw a blanket over his head. They took his revolver and keys and hurried to the entrance. Boyd disintegrated himself and ran for the door, overpowering the woman
