Measure Makes Slight Increase Over Two Years Ago.

The bill totals \$883,200, against a total of \$1,194,230 two years ago. In the bill introduced, however, no appropriation is made for the normal schools, because it is expected these institutions will be cared for in a bill pending.

Two years ago this appropriation amounted to \$27,000. Governor Morehead passed on the bill and endorsed it. The committee refused to create any
