Also it is said that the houses of ill-fame are to be banished beyond the gates of the city. It is further said to be within the future policy of the mayor to close the bootlegging joints. This, of course, will take time, and it is absolutely necessary, therefore, that in the interests of morality the present term of Mayor Hoctor be extended so as to save him from the worry and mental distraction that an election might entall. So far no word has been issued against the slot machines where drunken men and little children are alleged to have lost round sums of money. Hoctor defeated an ordinance against slot machines on a technicality.

Right down at the bottom the reform is said to mean nothing more than a writ of notice to those needing such notice that Hoctor is in supreme command of affairs and that if things do not go to his liking there will be trouble for the one opposing him. In the meantime citizens generally are waiting for Hoctor to appoint some good democrats without affiliation with the gang and with minds of their own to the places vacated by Ryan and Pivonka on the Board of Fire and Polica Commissioners.

Officered by Hoctor and his charter revision committee the office holders' union of South Omaha, in full panoply of war, descended yesterday upon the state legislature for the purpose of having their terms of office extended. The 'army" went down in several distinct divisions so as not unduly to arouse the feelings of the legislators from the Interior of the state. John B. Watkins, field marshal and commander-in-chief of the charter revision battalion, communicated the need of a bipartisan delegation to the war office in South Omaha and forthwith the order was given and the "boys" began to dig up reasons that
