> Out of 4.083 corporations in Nebraska 552 made a profit of \$5,000 or more during the last federal fiscal year, according to the annual report of the commission of internal revenue, which has just been issued. This represents 167-10 per cent of the corporations of the state.

The figures are gathered from the reports made by the corporations to Ross Hammond, collector of internal revenue for the district of Nebraska, and upon which reports are based the levy of corporation tax. The net income of these 4.083 corporations was given as \$18.909,-096.41 in an aggregate capital stock of \$269,645,121.05.
