TEACHERS ARE UNDECIDED

Cannot Make Up Their Minds to Criticize Dr. Connell.

DR. HOLOVCHINER WANTS IT

But the Doctor May Not Force the Issue—School Board Member Wants Mass Meeting of School Called.

Will Miss Kate M. High, principal, and the members of the faculty of the Omaha High school meet and pass a resolution endorsing Health Commissioner R. W. Connell for his statements before the Schoolmasters' club in which he declared there ought to be moral instructors at the high school?

This question is worrying the faculty of the high school and is also annoying Dr. Connell and Dr. Holoichiner, president of the Board of Education.

Dr. Holoichiner discussed the advisability of such action with Miss McHugh and instructors at the high school yesterday.

Reports from the conference indicate that there was opposition to the measure—an opposition more or less silent, because a teacher would have to do what the president of the school board asked or resign, as one teacher declared.

Dr. Connell says he has made no statements which he is not willing to stand by if it comes to a "showdown," and he believes what he said applies to high schools anywhere if the conditions are as he believes the recent juvenile court cases indicated they were at the central high school.

Connell said he believes a man and woman, who were not teachers, ought to be secured to give "straight" talks to the students, warning them of the danger of delinquent practices.

Butler Digs Up Old Claims of the City Against the County

Against the bills held by Douglas county against Omaha and the controversy over the cost of feeding prisoners kept in the county jail, City Commissioner Butler, head of the department of finances and accounts, has uncovered bills due the city from the county of Douglas in the sum of \$40,000.

These bills date back as far as 1888, and the interest in several instances is equal to the principal. The bills are chiefly for paying at the county hospital and about the county court house.

Ranging from \$709 to \$22,924.21, these bills have been tabulated by Mr. Butler and will be used in offsetting the amounts claimed by the county as due from the city. They are far in excess of the sum supposed to be due from the city to the county for feeding prisoners in the county jail, etc.

Fourteen-Year-Old Girl Kills Herself

Olive Snell, a 14-year old mulatto girl, found dead Thursday afternoon in a pasture near her parents' home at 409 Ames avenue, committed suicide by drinking carbolic acid. It was learned when a post mortem examination was held on the body of the girl.

The girl was seen by her mother at 9 o'clock in the morning. The body was found several hours later. Dr. Ellis was called, but the authorities were not notified until nearly 5 o'clock.

IMPROVEMENT CLUB WOULD PREFER CAR LINE EXTENSION

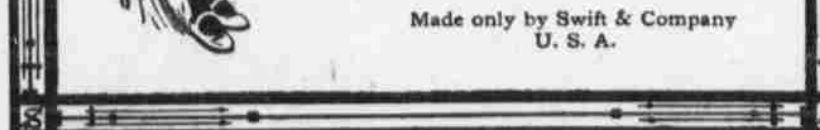
