Complaint Filed Against Man With Bullet in Heart

Deputy County Attorney Thomas Fitzgerald has filed a complaint in police court charging Carl Nelson, who attempted to commit suicide by shooting himself in the heart with a revolver in his room at Sixteenth and Vinton streets, following a quarrel with his sweetheart on January 23, with carrying concealed weapons.

Nelson is still in the hospital, but will be released the early part of next week. He will be arrested at the hospital and taken to the city jail, where he will be held for investigation.

Since he came to Omaha some months ago Nelson has been paying attention to a young girl in the south part of town. On January 25 he had a quarrel with the girl and left her house in a rage, threatening to kill himself. The girl visited him the next day.

Without warning he fired the revolver point blank into his breast. The bullet entered the heart, where it is still lodged. Little hope was held out for his recovery at first. However, he steadily improved.

The doctors say it is extraordinary for anyone to survive with a bullet in the heart, Nelson's case, they say, is one of the few exceptions.

Burlington Officials Meet Vice President Byram in Omaha

Restaurant Milk to Be Investigated

City Dairy Inspector Bossie will investigate all city restaurants in an attempt to ascertain to what extent the mixing of condensed skim milk with cream is practiced.

The dairy inspector says this practice has been called to his attention and while it is no violation of the food laws the deception will be prohibited. The condensed skim milk is mixed with cream to make it "thicker". Sometimes, says the inspector, instead of a mixture of cream and this milk the customers are served with condensed skim milk when they call for cream.
