NEW TOURNAMENT REGULATIONS

Challenge for Davis International Cup and Important Changes in Rules Decided Upon at Annual Meeting.

NEW YORK, Feb. 15.-The national clay court championship was awarded to the Omaha Field club at the annual Lawn Tennis association late tonight. A challenge for the Davis international

cup and important changes in the regulation of tennis tournaments in this country were decided upon. The most radical of the proposed changes, however, which would have barred from the amateur class all players who accepted board and loding or transportation from hotels in connection with tournaments failed to receive the pecessary two-thirds vote. The vote was 79 in favor to 68 against. The clause will come up automatically for consideration again next

The new regulations adopted defined in detail the amateur in tennis. The ranking committee was authorized to rank women players for 1913. The length of spikes in shoes was increased from oneeighth to one-fourth inch. The decision to challenge for the Davis cup did not include any details. It was decided to hold the national singles champlonship and the national women's championship was awarded to the Philadelphia Cricket

Robert D. Wrenn of New York was reelected president of the association. Other officers elected were: Vice president, H. W. Slocum, New York; treasurer, Richard Stevens, Hoboken, N. J.; secretary, A. L. Haskins, Philadelphia.

### Foot Ball Rules by the Committee

NEW YORK, Feb. 15.-Only minor hanges were made in the foot ball rules by the amalgamated intercollegiate and old rules committees at their session here last night. The numbering of players in order to aid the speciators in discreguishing individuals during the game was left to the option of the teams.

Rule 20, section 5, relating to a forward meeting of the United States National a goal or obstruction in end zone, was team attempts a forward pass from be-

hind its own goal line. Rule 6, section 2, was amended to allow snapping the ball only with the hands, eliminating the words "with the foot. The five-yard restriction on a kick has been removed, allowing a quick kick from behind the scrimmage line.

The penalty for not reporting a substitute player to an official was reduced from fifteen to five yards and the illegal return of a player to the game in the future will incur disqualification of the player and a loss of half the distance to

the goal line for the team. Several other points were discussed, but no action on them will be taken until tomorrow. Coyotes Pull Down 22 to 14 Victory After Hard Fight.

OMAHA U COVERED WITH GLORY

Players Work in Stellar Form and Best Game of Season is Witnessed by Large Crowd of Rooters.

In the fastest and most exciting game of basket ball that has been played pass which crosses the end line, striking in Omaha for many a day the University of South Dakota landed a well earned amended to exclude cases in which a victory over the University of Omaha basket ball team last night by the score of 22 to 14 at the University of Omaha gymnasium. Omaha lost the game, but covered itself with glory and surprised its most enthusiastic supporters by the plucky game and stubborn defense. South Dakota came here with a team touted as one of the fastest in the west and so far this year has beaten nearly all of the college teams in this part of the country. On the team were athletes who are known in all parts of the west.

> Game Starts Fast. The game started out badly for the locals. Their opponents were bigger and stronger and handled the ball with more ease. They started out with a rush that threatened veritably to sweep Omaha off its feet. Their passing was perfect, their accurate. Omaha soon took a brace and up until the game was even. The score see-sawed back and forth with Omaha leading and then following. Towards the middle of the half Omaha started to guard closely and prevented the opponents from carrying the ball past the center of the field. Omaha began to exceed in passing and at the close of the first half had the more standing, Omaha, 11; South Dakota. 10. Between halves the spectators who had kept things lively during the period gave way to their pent up joy and pandemonium reigned.

> Starts Well in Second. Omaha started out well in the second half and early increased its lead, but soon the strength and stamina of the northern giants began to manifest itself and by gradually wearing down the game Omaha quintet, the Coyotes forged into the lead which they did not again surrender.

Display Fine Team Work. During this period the Dakotans displayed the best team work and an adrottness in passing the ball that has never before been displayed in Omaha No matter where the ball was, a pair of Dakota arms seemed to insert themselves into the air and pull the sphere off of the ceiling of the building. The Omaha men being much shorter hurled themselves into the air and prevented many scores and broke up many plays.

The game while rough was free from any intentional dirty work and was entirely satisfactory to all of the spectators. Parish Easily Star.
