Consuls throughout Mexico reported the popular quiet pending news of a decisive action in Mexico City. Read Admiral Sutherland aboard the armored cruiser Colorado moved from Mazatlan to Manzanillo, where an anti-American demonstration was reported.

Orders to Consular Officers. Secretary Knox today telegraphed to all consular officers in Mexico to make it clear that the policy of the United States remains unchanged. Reports from consulates and Admiral Sutherland at Mazatlan said bitter anti-American feeling was being manifested because of rumors from Mexico City that military intervention had already begun.

DAKOTA PRISON SYSTEM COMMENDED BY COMMITTEE. PIERRE, S. D., Feb. 17.—The report of the South Dakota penitentiary investigation committee in both houses today commends the management of that institution and all of its officers and employees except Deputy Warden Collihan, who is declared to be unnecessarily harsh in his treatment of prisoners and subordinates. At the same time the report declares that rumors of brutal treatment of prisoners by Collihan have no foundation in fact.

YOUNG WOMAN DIES, WHILE MAN IS ALIVE. SIOUX FALLS, S. D., Feb. 17.—Miss Erickson, the young woman who with H. Robedee was found wounded in a boarding house here several days ago under circumstances which indicated an attempt at double suicide, succumbed to her injuries today. Robedee's condition thus far is satisfactory and unless something unforeseen occurs he will recover.

SPRINGFIELD MAN TAKEN. Herbert Robinson Accused of Violating White Slave Law. MARRIED WOMAN IN NEBRASKA. Forty Prominent Employes of Rock Island Lines Gather in Des Moines for Two Days' Meeting.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) DES MOINES, Feb. 17.—(Special Telegram)—Herbert Robinson of Springfield, Neb., was arrested by United States Immigration Inspector Whitefield at the county jail today as a white slave. Robinson fell into the federal dragnet for violation of the Mann act, through the pitiable story related to the federal officials by his wife, Dotie, aged 32. According to her statement, Whitefield, the woman declares she has been in bondage that bordered on imprisonment ever since they came to Des Moines, several months ago. She is said to have made the statement that after their marriage in Springfield, Neb., two years ago, her husband carried her to various towns in Nebraska, always forcing her to support him.

Rock Island Men Gather. Over forty prominent employes of the Rock Island lines are in Des Moines today for the first of a two days' convention. The session this afternoon was given over to general discussion of the problems of maintenance, and Superintendent W. P. Petersen of Des Moines was the principal speaker. The delegates at this year's convention come from the first district and include the states of South Dakota, Minnesota, Illinois, Iowa and Missouri. The delegates are chosen from among the roadmasters, division engineers and master carpenters.

HAMMILL GETS PROMOTION IN THE RAILWAY SERVICE. BOONE, Ia., Feb. 17.—Frederick P. Hammill, former superintendent of the Sioux City division of the Northwestern road, has been promoted to the post of assistant general superintendent of the Northwestern lines in Iowa, with headquarters at Boone, Ia. Hammill, superintendent of the Madison division, succeeds Mr. Hammill as superintendent of the Iowa division. Mr. Byington formerly was chief dispatcher of the Iowa division.

DRINK OF HAIR TONIC IS FATAL TO BARBER. WEIHESTER CITY, Ia., Feb. 17.—(Special Telegram)—Jesse Stewart, a barber at Jewell, drank a bottle of his own hair tonic this morning because he could buy no more in the town. He died in a few minutes. Stewart was from Iowa and had been in Jewell but a short time. He leaves a widow and one child.

FORMER CONGRESSMAN STRUBLE DROPS DEAD. LEMARR, Ia., Feb. 17.—(Special Telegram)—Hon. I. S. Struble, congressman from the Eleventh Iowa district from 1882 to 1890, dropped dead at the dinner table. He had been a sufferer from diabetes for some time, but was at his office as usual this morning.

Bill Passed. The following bills were passed by the senate this afternoon: S. F. 51, by Saunders of Douglas—Provides for jewelers' lien on jewelry left for repairs. S. F. 109, by Hoagland of Lincoln—Provides that no change can be made in the point of diversion of any flume or ditch more than one mile distant from the original point. S. F. 118, by Spirk of Saline—Makes sale of firearms to persons under 18 years unlawful.

S. F. 177, by Hoagland of Lincoln—Amends civil code authorizing the changing of procedure in assignment suits. S. F. 182, by Heasty of Jefferson—Provides for having in possession or property fraudulent receipt for fraternal insurance dues. S. F. 192, by Talcott of Cedar—Sanitary restriction for factories, mills and workshops. S. F. 178, by Haarmann of Douglas—Local health registrars of Omaha and other first-class cities to receive no compensation for having in possession or property fraudulent receipt for fraternal insurance dues. S. F. 191, by Dodge of Douglas—Provides for immediate removal of insane convicts from the penitentiary. S. F. 200, by Haarmann of Douglas—Provides for inspection of hauled and flaxseed oils and penalty for selling impure goods. S. F. 204, by Talcott of Cedar—Cream-testing licenses to be revoked by pure food commissioner when testers are found guilty of fraud. S. F. 211, by Hughes of Kimball—Allows regents of university to contract for irrigation rights at subexperimental stations. S. F. 222, by Hoagland of Lancaster—Regulates sale and disposal of embalming fluids containing arsenic and strychnine.

GOVERNOR HAS OWN IDEA Opposes Bill for Oil Inspector to Hold Fees Six Months. LINCOLN, Feb. 17.—(Special)—Governor Morehead and his political appointees do not see things with the same eyes, and as a result there is more or less friction in the administration machinery. The latest is the opposition of the governor to a portion of the bill providing for the consolidation of the food and oil departments.

Lincoln County Member in Minority in Grossman Contest. (From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Feb. 17.—(Special Telegram)—The committee of the senate on the Hancock-Grossman contest from Douglas county has prepared its report, but will not hand it in for a day or so. It is understood that four of the committee—Heasty, Kiechel, Olin and Placsek—will report in favor of Senator Grossman keeping his seat, while Hoagland will submit a minority report. It will be up to the senate to adopt either of the reports. It is understood that the minority report will be a severe criticism of the methods used in the Third ward of the city of Omaha at the elections.

JOAQUIN MILLER DIES; POET OF THE SIERRAS. SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 17.—"Joaquin" Miller, the poet of the Sierras, died at 5 o'clock this afternoon at his home in the Piedmont foothills. His daughter, Juanita, and his wife were with him. He had been in failing health for two years and unconscious since last Thursday.
