It was found to be a zinc plate about eight inches square, on which was deeply graven on one side: "Anno XXXI Regui, Ludovico, Pro Rege Illustris sini, Domino and Domino Marchione Beauharnels MDCCXXXXI (1741) Petrus Caultier, de le vendrie pos uit." On the reverse side is scratched with a sharp instrument: "Le 20 al Mars 1743," being March 30, 1743.
