

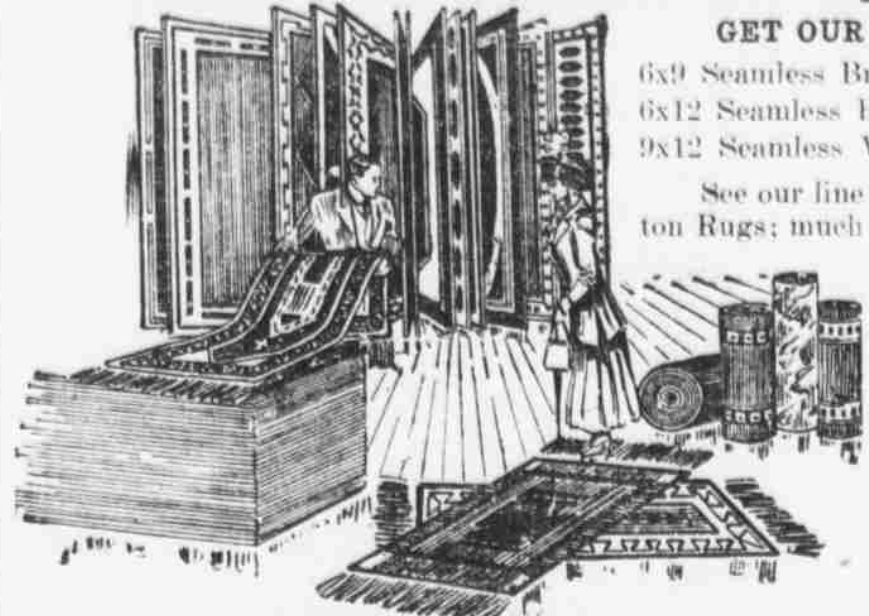

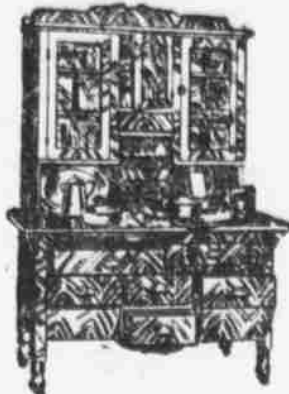

MILITIA TO ENLIST MEN

Orders Are Received for Local Companies to Be Ready.

RECRUITING OFFICE IS OPEN

Three Omaha Companies Will Be Enlarged to Their Full Quota Soon as It Is Possible.

Orders were received yesterday from the adjutant general's office by Captain Sterriker of the Nebraska National Guard to arrange his companies in full force to await further instructions.

No reason for this command has been given, but it in all probability has resulted from the Mexican agitation. The Omaha branch of the National Guard consists of three companies—G and L of the Second Infantry and I of the First—also the First regiment band.

This morning recruiting officers will be opened at the armory, Twentieth and Harney streets, and will be open every day from 8 a. m. till 10 p. m. Lieutenant William Leary, army surgeon, will be in charge and examine all applicants. The strength of the Omaha force is about 125, all the men being well drilled and possessed of the latest equipment and paraphernalia. At a few hours' notice they would be ready to take the field. About 150 recruits are expected to be gathered within the next few days at the station.

If the troops are called for active duty the mobilization will take place at Lincoln, and in six hours' time from the receipt of marching orders all will be in readiness to depart.

CHURCHES DECIDE TO BRING SUNDAY HERE

Thirty churches of Omaha Monday night reported at a meeting of the clergy and laity at the Young Men's Christian association in favor of bringing Billy Sunday, the renowned evangelist, to Omaha the early part of 1914. A permanent organization for the purpose of bringing Sunday to Omaha will be formed in the near future and three committees were named to serve on the permanent organization. Chairmen of the committees are: Financial, George F. Gilmore; co-operative and civic organizations, Rev. F. T. Rouse; additional membership, Rev. H. B. Spear.

PARCEL POST BUSINESS CONTINUES TO INCREASE

Monday was the largest day at the Omaha postoffice, in point of business, since the inauguration of the parcel post system. Over 500 packages were received and sent out by the local clerks. MISS BRYAN WINS HONORS

Woman Member Creighton Pharmacy Seniors Gains First Place.

COMPETED WITH 71 STUDENTS

Stood Head and Shoulders Above All of Them in Examinations Before the State Board of Pharmacy.

Word has been received by the faculty of the Creighton College of Pharmacy that Miss Virginia Bryan of Lincoln, one of the senior class, who received a diploma at the commencement exercises last evening, won first place in the examinations held before the State Board of Pharmacy at Lincoln February 4 and 12. Her grades were as follows: Chemistry, 96; pharmacy, 91; materia medica, 92; toxicology, 92 and oral miscellaneous, 90; average, 92.4.

Seventy-one students representative of the pharmacy schools of Creighton, Fremont and Highland Park of Des Moines, took the examination and there were a number of failures. An average of 75 was necessary to pass, while one grade below 60 meant failure. Miss Bryan, with the single exception of a young woman from Fremont college, was the only one of her sex entered.

When asked concerning the matter Miss Bryan was exceedingly modest concerning her new honors, and was loath to have anything said of her work. "Hard work did it," she said. "The first year's work was terribly hard, but the second was easier. Members of the faculty confirm this statement, stating that after the first three months at the pharmacy college Miss Bryan was ready to quit because she found the work so difficult. But she persisted and made brilliant records in her school examinations during the last year. The oral examination given by the state board is unusually stiff, as it covers practically all of the four subjects covered in the written exams. Miss Bryan said she was nervous during the examination, but did better than she expected, adding that the examiners were very pleasant to her.

It is necessary to pass the state board examination before one can become a registered pharmacist, although failure on the state board does not mean that a student will not be passed by the school authorities. Two years of experience are required, however, before a student can take the state board.

Nolen Must Await Action by United States Grand Jury

Ernest Nolen, who is confined in the county jail on a charge of conspiracy to liberate his brother, Diggs Nolen, from the county jail, and who agreed to plead guilty if given an early trial, will have to await a hearing before the United States federal grand jury, which convenes in April.

According to the government statutes a prisoner cannot be given a criminal trial prior to his being indicted by the grand jury. Nolen has never been indicted, and consequently will have to wait until the latter part of April for a trial. He may change his agreement to plead guilty in the meantime and decide to fight the case.
