

ASK PARK IMPROVEMENTS

Federation of Improvement Clubs Points Out Need of Mor. Parks.

OMAHA IS NOW OUTCLASSED

They Say in Comparison with Other Cities It is Away in Advance in Point of Improvements and Beautification.

The Northwest Federation of Improvement clubs, consisting of the Clifton Hill, Walnut Hill, Lincoln Heights and Fontanelle clubs, at a meeting at Richard Bunnell's, Forty-fifth street and Bedford avenue Tuesday night, went on record as unanimously approving the bill pending before the legislature granting Omaha people the right to vote \$1,000,000 in bonds for parks, boulevards and public playgrounds.

Harry Hackett moved the adoption of the resolution in support of which he presented the figures showing the money spent by the following cities for park purposes: St. Paul, \$48,000 to date; Minneapolis, \$2,068,000; Kansas City, \$1,106,233.77; Denver, \$3,570,200; Seattle, bonds in the sum of \$4,000,000, recently voted; Detroit, \$2,811,000.

"Omaha is completely outclassed," said Mr. Hackett. "We have spent to date a total of \$200,000 on parks, boulevards and play grounds. We appropriate to maintain our parks \$53,000 a year. Denver appropriates for the same purpose \$247,284 a year."

Another resolution was passed approving the bill to increase the salaries of county officials. The club thought some of the county officials' salaries ought to be increased, although they believe others receive sufficient pay. This resolution follows:

Whereas, certain organizations have expressed themselves as being favorable to giving some of our county officers an increase in salary, a few others have expressed themselves against, without investigating the merits, it is hereby Resolved, That it is the sense of this meeting that some of the increases of salary should be granted, that some of the increases asked for should not be given any consideration and that our representatives at Lincoln are able to pass on the merits of claimants.

Among the officials whose salaries the federation believed ought to be increased are Treasurer W. G. Urs and County Clerk Frank Dewey.

In another resolution the club went on record as opposing the Water board's plan of assessing 50 cents per front foot for the extension of private water mains. The club favored the paying for such extensions out of Water board funds.

A last resolution was passed in which it was urged upon the board of education to erect a new school building on the Clifton Hill site, the club believing the present building is antiquated and that a new one is needed.

The board also endorsed H. J. Hackett as a member of the charter committee.

PUBLIC IS INVITED TO HIGH SCHOOL OPENING

The domestic science department of the High school will serve a luncheon to the school's guests on the afternoon of March 8, when the school will be thrown open to the public for the first time since its completion.

Superintendent E. U. Graff has announced the opening of the school on that date and urged all teachers to attend. The circular says:

"There will be an address by Chancellor Avery of the University of Nebraska. Classes will be held in domestic science, manual training, physical training, etc. The Glee club will sing.

"The Board of Education is anxious to have the parents of the city visit the High school. Teachers are not only invited, but urged to find time to go to the school some time between the hours of 1 and 4 o'clock in the afternoon.

PUGLISSI ON TRIAL FOR SECOND TIME FOR MURDER

Second trial of Sebastiano Puglissi, slayer of Constable John A. Woods, for first degree murder has begun before Judge Charles Leslie in the criminal division of the district court. After the first trial last autumn the jury disagreed.

Puglissi fatally shot the constable April 25, 1912, when Woods called at his home to replenish furs. The defense is that when Puglissi entered his home he found the constable quarreling with his wife. Mrs. Puglissi had fallen to the floor. Not knowing Woods was an officer and thinking he was trying to kill his wife, the defendant says he fought with him and shot him.

ESTELLE RECEIVES SOME ENCOURAGEMENT FOR BILL

Congressmen C. O. Lobeck, M. P. Kincaid and John A. Maguire all of Nebraska, have written to Judge Lee Estelle that they will oppose the bill to transfer the Pacific branch of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers to the jurisdiction of the War Department.

Judge Estelle is one of the committee appointed by the Nebraska Grand Army of the Republic to send resolutions of protest against the bill to Nebraska's representatives in the national house and senate. The congressmen in their letters say in all probability the bill, passed by the senate, will be killed in the house.

PUBLICITY LEAGUE IS ARRANGING CONVENTION

George Wois of Fremont, president, and E. R. Kelsa of Lincoln, secretary of the Nebraska Publicity League, will come to Omaha to make arrangements for the annual convention of the organization, to be held in Omaha. The dates are set for some time in April. The convention probably will be held at the same time the Northwest Division of the Associated Advertising Clubs convenes here.

Realty Men Refuse to Indict Members of the Legislature

The Real Estate exchange refused to indict the Nebraska legislature for questionable motives in handling legislation affecting Omaha at the instance of a resolution offered by W. T. Graham. The resolution was very general and vaguely accused legislators of having ulterior motives in opposing the passage of the water district bill, the electric light franchise bill, dollar gas bill and others, and came very close, as some who opposed the adoption of the resolution said, to calling the state legislators crooks and thieves. There was some discussion on both sides of the question and then a motion to table it was passed.

The exchange adopted a resolution opposing the passage of Senate File No. 249, which, the introducer of the resolution said, was a bill providing that the rights of electric railway and light companies shall be determined by the state railway commission, taking such corporations from under the supervision of cities of the metropolitan class.

After the meeting had been pronounced adjourned, W. T. Graham made a motion that five members of the exchange represent the body at Lincoln Thursday night at the hearing on the bill abolishing the Omaha Water board. The motion was pronounced carried and the five committeemen will be named. Their expenses will be paid by the exchange.

Fifteen minutes of the session was devoted to the reading of a memorial on the late Henry T. Clarke and tribute by the members to his memory.
