SUPFRAGISTS ARE ON PARADE

Several Thousand March Down Pennsylvania Avenue.

MRS. BURLISON IN COMMAND

Petticoat Cavalry, Marching Clubs in Variety of Costumes and Numerous Floats Features of the Procession.

WASHINGTON, March 3.—This was woman's day of political crowning glory short of actually possessing the universal right to vote. For several thousand of them turned out to form a great procession in Pennsylvania avenue to demonstrate the unanimity of their sex in its demand for the ballot.

Even before the procession started, enthusiastic thousands lined the street. Thousands greeted the small detachments and great applause marked the progress of "General" Rosalie Jones and her little band of "birds" as they proceeded to the rendezvous. Men and women alike joined in the demonstration and the human walls that lined the route of march formed a sea of tossing handkerchiefs and waving flags.

Precision and business-like methods marked the carrying out of plans for the parade, which was to form at and around the Peace monument. Trumpeters stationed at intervals in the distance, stretching to the rear, were ready to sound the "advance" as the head of the parade started.

The program of pacification will, it is expected, be put to some severe test. A band of adherents of Zapata fired on a federal troop train running from the capital to Cuernavaca yesterday and sixty soldiers were killed or wounded. Similar bands of Zapatistas continue committing depredations in the federal district and in the state of Morelos, indicating that some mountain rebel to the south of the capital are determined to keep up their warfare despite the negotiations between the government and the brothers Zapata.

While the federal government expressed itself as sanguine of success in the northern states, a lack of harmony between the various bands of rebels in that region was developed on the arrival here of representatives of Orozco and other chiefs. Today and tomorrow are to be devoted to conferences between these rebel representatives and ministers of war and interior.

The railroads between the capital and the north are still interrupted. There has been practically no mail from the United States for fifteen days except that brought by steamer to Vera Cruz.

ITALY INCREASES ITS ARMY

Garrisons and Forts Along Swiss Frontier Strengthened.

SIMPSON TUNNEL IS MINED

Pass Through Alps Can Be Closed Instantly — Austria Increases Levy for New Troops to 300,000.

GENEVA, Switzerland, March 3.—The Italian government has joined the rest of the European continental powers in making military preparations. It has increased the Italian garrisons along the Swiss frontier and military engineers are engaged in the building of new forts commanding passes from the mouth of Simpon tunnel toward the east.

Chambers for mines have been excavated at the Italian entrance to the Great Simpson tunnel and these have been fitted with secret electrical connections so that by pressing a button twenty miles away the tunnel can be shunted.

In the center of the Simpson tunnel there is a massive steel door which may be worked from either the Swiss or Italian side to block the passage of trains or troops.

VIENNA, March 3.—A sensation has been caused by a statement in Die Zeitung that the annual levy of recruits will be increased by 3,000. This would add 30,000 in all to the effective war strength as 270,000 men were summoned in the original levy.

Russia Accepts Turkish Proposal. LONDON, March 3.—The Daily Mail's Sofia correspondent learns that Russian considers that the Turkish proposals form a basis for new peace negotiations. Dr. Danoff, head of the Bulgarian peace delegation, has consulted with the Russian minister on the subject and is proceeding to Demotika to consult army headquarters with regard to the new frontiers.

CONSTANTINOPLE, March 3.—Fighting has completely ceased during the two days along the Tebatjaj lines and at Bulair, owing to a heavy snowstorm. The Bulgarians and Serbians investing the fortress of Adrianople bombarded the city throughout Sunday.

PROCEDURE IS CUMBERSOME

Calling Roll in Committee of Whole Delays Business.

LINCOLN, Neb., March 3.—(Special.)—To some of the house members the plan of calling the roll in the committee of the whole is a bad business, and if it is continued there is little likelihood of all bills now on general file being carefully considered.

SUIT FILED AGAINST

Thread Combine

TRENTON, N. J., March 3.—The so-called thread trust was attacked by the federal government in a civil anti-trust suit filed today, seeking the dissolution of the alleged attempt to monopolize by the "Coates Interests" of Great Britain of the thread trade of the United States, including that of the American Thread company, itself a consolidation of fourteen American companies.

Under the domination of J. and P. Coates (limited) of Great Britain, it is indicated that the interstate and foreign trade in this country has been restrained by combinations and unfair competitive methods. The court is asked to order the disintegration of all the combinations in this country controlled by the "Coates," into such units as will restore competition, and to restrain the continuance of unfair competitive methods alleged. If necessary to accomplish the result, the court is asked to appoint a receiver for the properties.

Among the defendants are the American Thread company (New Jersey), The Thread Agency (New Jersey), The Spool Cotton company (New Jersey), The Clark Mills-End Spool Cotton company (New Jersey), George A. Clark and Brother (New Jersey), J. & P. Coates, Inc. (Rhode Island), James Chadwick and Brother, Ltd. (Great Britain), J. & P. Coates, Ltd. (Great Britain).

The petition, signed by Attorney General Wickersham and James A. Fowler, assistant to the attorney general, was filed by United States Attorney Vreeland.
