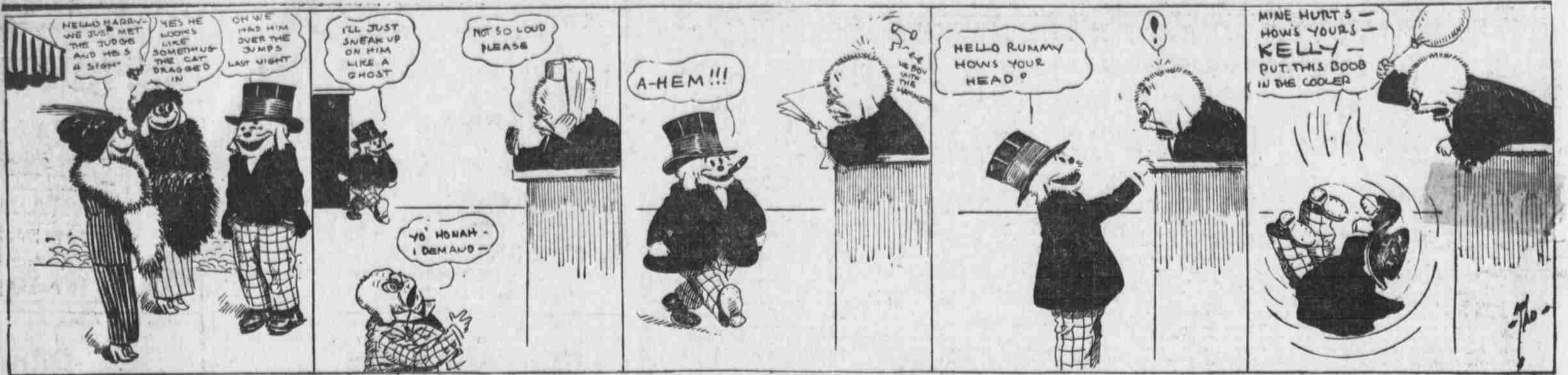


Silk Hat Harry's Divorce Suit---The Morning After the Night Before

DOMESTIC SERVANT PROBLEM

Question Up for General Discussion Before Philosophical Society.

MRS. HAYES LEADS IN ARGUMENT

Numerous Speakers Express Ideas as to How the Girls in the Homes Should Be Paid and Treated.

Solution of the domestic servant problem lies in observance of the second commandment, "Love Thy Neighbor as Thyself," according to Mrs. C. W. Hayes, president of the Omaha Women's club, who said as much in a discussion before the Omaha Philosophical society yesterday afternoon.

"Eliminate caste, recognize the true worth of the servant, and the dignity of her work, realize that her labor is not degrading, nor despicable, and you will have gone a long way toward solution of this great question," said Mrs. Hayes. She denounced the false idea of respectability and social standing which make girls prefer work in offices, schools, factories and stores at less net income than could be earned at housework. She told of the hardships, humiliations, and misfortunes of the house maid and declared the conditions which make her occupation shunned, and should be eliminated. "The employer should maintain a Christian attitude toward her maid," said Mrs. Hayes. "She should be kind and friendly and considerate; the demand for good maids exceeds the supply, but I must also say that there is a great scarcity of women who know how properly to treat their maids."

General discussion followed Mrs. Hayes' address. Among the remarks made by the dozen or more speakers were the following: "It is not the domestic servant problem, but the domestic service problem. One reason that the demand for servant girls exceeds the supply is that a lot of women wish to employ girls to do the work they should do themselves. In business a man employs help when there is more work than he can do himself. It should be the same in the business of keeping house. A woman should employ servant girls only when her housework is so heavy she can't do it all herself. But many women as soon as their husband's able to pay to quit their housework and hire it done so they can idle away their time, play cards and engage in society activities."

"Women shouldn't employ servants until they have money enough to pay what they are worth and give them suitable accommodations, including a room where they can receive their company and not be ashamed."

"Servant girls are not paid more, even considering board and room, than stenographers and school teachers, and factory and shop girls. The servant girl has little time to herself, while the others have only certain hours to work. Then their time is their own. Paying the average servant girl's wages at \$25 a week, which is probably high, and board and room at \$5 a month, which is a reasonable figure, the servant girl's income is about \$31 a month. How many people who claim they are paying their

servant girls this much in money and board and room would be willing to pay them \$61 cash and let them board and room themselves?" "The family ought to take the servant girl into the circle and treat her as a member of the family."

"Maybe the girl wouldn't want to be treated as a member of the family, but instead, simply as a laborer worthy of her hire, having certain rights that must be respected. There are and always will be class distinctions. These are desired as much by the so-called lower classes as by the so-called higher classes. Stenographers, clerks and factory girls do not associate socially with the superintendents and department heads under whom they work any more than the servant girls associate with their mistresses. They don't want to. They would rather associate with their own classes."

"If the employer would pay the servant girl \$5 a week more than the regular wage, she could rent herself a room in a boarding house or in some private home of her own class and there receive her company and live just like girls working in factories, stores and offices."

AFFAIRS AT SOUTH OMAHA

Filings for City Offices in and Candidates Being Sized Up.

TWO TICKETS IN THE FIELD

Names of Some of the Parties Seeking Office May Leave Bad Taste in Mouths of Voters of Both Parties.

Yesterday was the "day after" in South Omaha political circles. The filings show two forces at work. One is headed by the republicans and regular democrats and the other is dominated by the Gillin gang with all that the gang can command or coax into supporting it. Hoctor, who has valiantly denied his connection with the Gillin gang, showed his hand plainly Saturday night, when John Cusma, a pool hall keeper and a friend of Hoctor's, filled for the progressive nomination for mayor.

Martin Swanson, whom no one seemed to have known or heard of, was dug up for the progressive nomination for treasurer. Against Jerry Fitzgerald, who is supported for tax commissioner by democrats and republicans alike, the Gillinites brought out Joe Durfy, in the saloon business for years. A saloon man in the western section of the city stated Saturday morning that every effort was being made by the Gillinites to get some one against Jerry Fitzgerald. Gillen has fought Fitzgerald for years, simply because Fitzgerald will not play gang politics and bow down to the little boss of the city treasury. John Riches, another saloonkeeper, stated Saturday night: "I did not want to file and I don't want the office, but they kept after me for two weeks until I got tired and gave in. Riches filed for councilman of the Second ward."

H. W. Warner, bartender, filed for councilman in the Third ward, while P. J. Ford, saloon keeper, filed for councilman of the Fourth ward, as did August Schmidt, a money lender. For the democratic race for mayor, the fight will be between Dr. T. H. Ensor and Jerry Howard. Ensor is known as an "economical administrator," as is shown by the records and he has the reputation of keeping his word to the letter. Jerry Howard is strong with the laboring men and is known to be honest. Hoctor has the name of being unpendable politically, as is shown by the fact that he was backed and elected to office a year ago by the strong Irish vote, which he immediately proceeded to repudiate by giving nearly all his appointments elsewhere.

HUERTA MAKING PROGRESS

Provisional Mexican Head Gains More Control.

MEXICANS ATTACK TROOPERS

Six of Former Reported Killed in an Engagement Near Douglas, Ariz., Along Boundary Line.

MEXICO CITY, March 3.—The first week of Huerta's administration has seen notable improvements in the general situation, but it is apparent that many weeks must pass before complete order is restored. There is little doubt that the old Orozco army will be mustered out or incorporated in the regular establishment. But the rebels in the south, the Zapatistas seem likely to furnish the administration with the same problem as they did the Madero administration. A number of Zapatistas have surrendered, but Emiliano Zapata himself is still in the field and thousands of his men are continuing the warfare as outlaws, burning haciendas and raiding villages. Coahuila Rebellion. There is a most serious development in the north, especially in Coahuila, where Venustiano Carranza, the governor, far from recognizing the Huerta government, has grown stronger in his opposition each day. In the north and in the south the gov-

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ernment troops are conceded to be in control, and it would appear that little time will elapse before the rebels are forced to fight and of the outcome, the government is entirely optimistic. The presence in Mexico City of Jose Cordova, the personal representative of Pascual Orozco, Jr., furnishes concrete evidence of the desire of the rebels of the north to co-operate with the government.

HILLES GOES TO NEW YORK TO TAKE LONDON AGENCY

WASHINGTON, March 3.—Charles Dewey Hilles, secretary to President Taft for the last two years, will quit the White House March 4, to become a partner of Edmund Dwight, resident manager at New York of the Employers' Liability Assurance corporation, limited, of London. Mr. Hilles will retain the chairmanship of the republican national committee, for which he was chosen last summer.
