# Suffragist Found Guilty of Arson

LONDON, March 7 .- Mrs. "Joyce Locke," a militant suffragette whose real name is Olive W. Wharry, was sentenced today at the Old Bailey Sessions to eighteen months imprisonment. She was found guilty of setting fire to a pavillion in the Kow Botanical gardens on February D.

When arraigned in police court on the day of her arrest she hurled a book at the magistrate and fought desperately against removal to a cell. The court today ordered her to pay all

costs and to deposit a \$1,000 bond to insure her good behavior for two years after the completion of her sentence. The judge warned Olive Wharry that she would be sentenced to an additional year if she did not keep the peace after

finishing her prison sentence. Mrs. Wharry declared she would not pay the costs of the prosecution and would immediately start a "hunger strike.'

When sentence was pronounced Miss Wharry retorted: "I refuse to pay these costs. You can

send me to prison, but I will never pay a penny. Nor do I intend to stay in prison As for sureties-never!"

"If you do not care to give sureties, you will be further imprisoned for a period not exceeding a year," replied thu
