CHICAGO, March & Wheat supporters gave evidence today of a bearlah feel-ing based on a theory that very large farm reserves would be shown in the official report, due Monday. Closing prices were unsettied, %@%c to %c under last night. Corn finished %@%c to %c down, and oats off %c to %@%c. In provisions, the outcome was 5c to 20c decline.
