NEW WAR CLOUD IN BALKANS

Austria Orders Serbia to Recall the Troops Investing Scutari.

SITUATION BECOMES ACUTE

Serbia Refuses to Obey Request, Saying that it is Bound by Provisions of Treaty to Aid its Allies.

BELGRADE, Serbia, March 11.—The Austrian government today took a step regarded as equivalent to forbidding Serbia to send troops to assist the Montenegrins in capturing the Turkish fortress of Scutari.

The Austrian minister of Serbia, Baron Von Ugron Von Abranfalva, informed Premier Paticch that his government objected to Serbian troops assisting in the siege of Scutari, which was to become the capital of Albania. He requested the immediate recall of any Serbian troops which had been dispatched there.

The Serbian premier in reply pointed out that under treaty arrangements Serbia was compelled to assist its allies without regard to the future of Scutari.

Situation is delicate. The situation is regarded as extremely delicate. Feeling here is at a high pitch over the attitude taken by Austria.

When the European powers decided in principle on the autonomous Albania in which Scutari was to be included, the king of Montenegro declared he would enter the fortress at the head of his troops, otherwise the reign of his family was doomed.

Serbian Troops Advance

In the meantime the Serbian troops had completed their campaign in Macedonia and Albania and advanced to the Adriatic coast at Durazzo, whence on March 7 they dispatched on board transports 5,000 Serbian troops including artillery to assist in the siege of Scutari.

It was this activity of Serbia which called forth the Austrian protest today.

Newspaper Seeks to Enjoin Enforcement of Publicity Law

WASHINGTON, March 11.—Counsel for the New York Journal of Commerce today applied to the supreme court to restrain Postmaster General Burleson from immediately enforcing the "Newspaper publicity law."

Former Postmaster General Hitchcock had agreed not to attempt to enforce the law pending a prompt appeal to the supreme court from the decision of the federal courts in New York.

The request was based on an agreement between counsel, the Department of Justice and the Postoffice department last August that no action would be taken by the Postoffice department to compel newspaper publishers to comply with the law or enforce any of its penalties until the supreme court had passed on its validity.

Robert G. Morris, counsel for the Journal of Commerce, in a statement to the supreme court declared that on March 4 the postmaster of New York had notified the paper that unless the statements required by the law were filed at once he would proceed to enforce its penalties. Similar letters, the attorney charged, had been sent to other newspapers throughout the country.

Since March 4 Attorney Morris declared, Postmaster General Burleson had informed him verbally that unless the required returns were made on or before March 11, he would enforce the penalties, which include disbarment from the mails.

The law requires newspapers to file with the government and publish twice each year a sworn statement showing the names of their bondholders, security holders, stockholders, the amount of the daily circulation and to designate all paid for articles as "advertisement."

The supreme court has had the validity of the law under consideration for several months, but has announced no decision.

The court took the motions of Mr. Morris under advisement.

Solicitor General Bullitt stated verbally that the government took cognizance of the motion, but did not agree to all the statements set forth as facts in the statement Mr. Morris filed with the court.

Later Mr. Bullitt stated that his recollection was that the Postoffice department had informally agreed not to enforce the law for a reasonable time, but it did not specifically agree not to enforce the law until the supreme court had passed on it.

Man Who Stole Big Amount of Jewelry Blames it on Woman

SAN FRANCISCO, March 11.—Owen D. Conn, who confessed here yesterday to burglaries which netted him more than \$100,000 in the last two years, amplified his confession today regarding his beginnings in crime in Chicago, but gave no details of his operations there.

"I was infatuated with the wife of a former Chicago minister," he said, "and she made me get money for her. She induced me to rob a number of flats in the day time, occasionally assisted. She wanted me to hold up a man, but I refused and she got a younger man to do the job. She ran away with him and I came to the Pacific coast. I had been working as a bookkeeper in Chicago, where my mother and sister live."

Conn is 36 years old, dark haired, quiet and unassuming and well educated. He was captured here Saturday after a running fight with citizens and police in which he was severely wounded and his confession was made at a local hospital. About \$20,000 worth of loot was found in his room at a fashionable hotel.

The police tonight, through letters from his mother found in Conn's effects, definitely established his right name as Owen D. Conn. According to his confession Conn has stolen jewelry worth \$100,000 in the last two years. That which he stole in Chicago and Los Angeles here were pawned in Los Angeles. Numerous pawn tickets were found in his suit case.

Friedmann Treats Thirty Cases in Montreal Hospital

MONTREAL, March 11.—Dr. Friedrich Friedmann demonstrated a treatment for tuberculosis at the Royal Edward Institute here today. A large crowd of sufferers from the malady waited outside the building all morning for him to make his appearance.

Prior to visiting the institute Dr. Friedmann was taken to the medical laboratory of McGill university, where he prepared his vaccine.

"My first step in Montreal," Dr. Friedmann said, "will be to treat cases of visible tuberculosis in the presence of physicians and thereby accomplish the double purpose of instructing them and proving the efficacy of the use of live germs in tuberculosis. What I mean by visible tuberculosis is fungi on the knee for instance, visible to the eye."

Thirty cases in all were treated by Dr. Friedmann here today. While he was holding his clinic the throng of sufferers outside of the building was swollen by hundreds. They were all turned away. The hospital authorities, touched by their pleas, gave them medicine and arranged for those in advanced stages to return again for regular treatment.

First Harriman Dissolution Plan is Not a Success

NEW YORK, March 11.—No agreement on the dissolution plan of the Union Pacific railroad company and the Southern Pacific company was reached today at meetings of the directors of the two companies and the executive committee of the Union Pacific.

Neither the executive committee nor the directors of the Union Pacific will meet again this week. This was accepted as an indication that the agreement between the Union Pacific railroad company and the aggregate of bankers to finance its \$135,000,000 holdings of the Southern Pacific would be permitted to lapse. This agreement expires next Saturday.

Regarding reports of a possible application to the courts for the appointment of a friendly receiver to take charge of the Union Pacific assets in the Southern Pacific company, directors of the Union Pacific said that "such action would rest with the courts."
