### NEBRASKA RETAILERS MEET

Principal Speaker of Day Advocates Banking Reform Legislation.

IS AN IMPORTANT NECESSITY

Business Men Should Implore Their Congressmen to Work for Immediate Relief from Present Financial System.

The seventh annual convention of the Federation of Nebraska Retailers was called to order at Hotel Rome at 9:30 yesterday morning by C. E. Reinert of Wymore, the president. Nearly 400 merchants, representing points throughout Nebraska, were in attendance, and seriously began the solution of the many problems which confront them in their everyday business.

The principal address of the morning was by A. D. Welton of Chicago, secretary of the National Citizens' league, which is promoting a banking reform legislation in the next congress.

Welton went into the details of the trouble the banks and merchants of the country have had in times past and are still having, because of the monetary system. He declared that some kind of relief was bound to come at the next congressional session regardless of whether it be a central reserve association, as first introduced by Senator Aldrich, or several reserve centers in various parts of the United States.

"The present monetary system," said Welton, "is the greatest element in the high cost of living." He declared that other troubles such as the tariff, had been held forth in times past as the great causes of the high cost of living, but that the country had generally come to believe that banking methods as at present practiced are mightily involved in the expenses of modern living.

### For Banking Reform.

In conclusion the speaker urged the members of the retailers' association to implore their congressmen to work for immediate banking reform. Welton said President Wilson desired immediate remedial, but because of the democratic tariff pledges of many years, that matter would come first. Also that the president once told him that currency reform was more important than tariff reductions, but for the reason of immediately carrying out platform pledges the tariff will get first consideration.

"The whole question of banking reform," said he, "has been hurried forward by the work of the National Citizens' league, organized in Chicago two years ago. The league now has members in every state in the union."

### Hays is Absent.

T. W. Hays of Minden did not deliver his address on "Fire Insurance" at the opening session. It was announced that he had been taken ill at his home, but would probably appear later. The address of welcome was delivered by Mayor Dahlman. President Reinert responded on behalf of the visitors and dispensed with the president's annual address.

A feature of the opening session was the discussion brought up through the question box. G. W. Darnier of Bethany, vice president of the association, conducted the department. Questions on credit, selling, lowering than wholesale cost, handling nationally advertised goods and other subjects of importance to the country merchant were discussed affirmatively and negatively.

### Woman Asks \$50,000 for Refusal of Man to Keep His Promise

Samuel Bell, wealthy retired farmer past middle age, is resisting a suit in Judge Sutton's court for \$50,000 damages, brought by Mrs. Katherine McGuire, who alleges that Mr. Bell promised to marry her. A quarter section of Douglas county land, worth \$20,000; cash to the amount of \$10,000 and a home in Omaha were to have been transferred to Mrs. McGuire, it is alleged.

It was in consideration of these alleged promises that Mrs. McGuire secured a divorce from her husband in September, 1911, according to her testimony. Mr. Bell afterwards appeared to desire to put off the wedding indefinitely.

The acquaintance is three years old. During the first two years, the plaintiff asserts, Mr. Bell exhibited to her large sums of money and even went so far as to put into her hands a deed to the quarter section of land, but she afterwards returned it to him.

Mrs. McGuire also admitted borrowing numerous amounts from Mr. Bell, and she was sure she had paid back. He also bought for her a dress, a pair of shoes and a pair of slippers.

A photograph of Mr. Bell and Mrs. McGuire, taken together, was shown to the jury. Letters from Mr. Bell in which he called her "My Dear" were exhibited.

Mrs. McGuire said that after the divorce, up till April of 1912, Mr. Bell had talked of marrying her. One day early in April they were alone in an upstairs room. She was at the piano and played "Will You Marry Me." Mr. Bell then asked her when she would be ready to marry him and she said whenever he wished. It was after that that his ardor cooled.

Mrs. McGuire testified that throughout their acquaintance Mr. Bell was jealous and urged her not to go with other men, but she denied that she had done so except in a casual and merely friendly manner.

### FRED ANHEUSER SUFFERS RELAPSE FROM ILLNESS

Reports from the home of City Prosecutor Fred Anheuser are that he is dangerously ill, having suffered a relapse several days ago. Anheuser was taken ill a week ago with intestinal trouble and typhoid later developed. Dr. Lee has charge of the case.

### BILL FOR MORE FIRE ESCAPES

McGovern Introduces Ordinances Providing Better Protection.

### POWER TO FORCE CONSTRUCTION

Insurance Companies Have Made Threat to Raise the Rates Unless Commission Makes More Stringent Laws.

First definite step toward the safeguarding of the lives of hotel and apartment house inmates and the prevention of another catastrophe like the Dewey hotel holocaust was taken by the city commission yesterday, when Commissioner Thomas McGovern introduced an ordinance providing new fire escape and hotel inspection regulations. The ordinance was referred to the meeting of the committee of the whole Monday for discussion.

Under this new ordinance, which amends the old, hotel proprietors as well as the owners of flats and apartments must equip all four-story buildings with metallic and automatic fire escapes in numbers pronounced adequate by the building inspector. Two story buildings must be equipped with an outside metallic escape for at least every fifty persons and an inside automatic escape for every twenty-five persons.

### Inspector to Give Notice.

Further it is provided that the building inspector shall notify all proprietors of the requirements of the ordinance and that they shall at once comply or be subject to a fine of from \$10 to \$100. When the owners of hosteleries comply with the ordinance the building inspector shall issue a certificate certifying to the

fact that the proprietor has complied with the ordinance. This certificate is to be printed in red and kept posted in a conspicuous place near the entrance or entrances.

Power is placed in the hands of the building inspector to force immediate compliance with the ordinance. "And if it passes we will see that all comply," said McGovern. "The provisions of this ordinance are needed and will, I believe, relieve the situation."

Insurance men have threatened to raise the rate on hotels unless the city commission proceeded to pass an ordinance embodying the regulations which, it is believed, will conduce to the safety of guests and property. The ordinance drafted by McGovern was not discussed by the commission, but will be openly considered Monday.
