VOTE DISPROVES STATEMENT

Official Count of Ballots Disproves Water Board Views.

WOULD BE ELECTED, ANYWAY

If Votes of Third and Tenth Wards Were Entirely Withdrawn Results for Three Contestants Would Be Changed.

The official count of the vote cast at the charter commission election Tuesday disproves conclusively the statements emanating from Water board sources that the "gang" elected the fifteen commissioners, giving them necessary majorities in the Third and Tenth wards.

Excluding the vote cast for all candidates in these wards and this disfranchising their residents, the fifteen men elected all lead except three. Jacob Kopp, a socialist, would displace one of these and Samuel Burns, Jr., and Robert S. Wilcox would take the place of the other two.

Lovett, chairman of the Union Pacific Railroad company; Julian Kruttschnitt, chairman of the Southern Pacific, and other officers of these companies left today for St. Louis to appear before the United States circuit court tomorrow in connection with the presentation of the modified plan for the dissolution of the two railroads under the decree of the United States supreme court.

California Stands Pat.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 14.—The California Railroad commission on the date now before it finds itself unable to pronounce an opinion on the modified plan for the dissolution of the Union Pacific-Southern Pacific merger presented by the railroad attorneys. In a message to Attorney General McReynolds outlining its policy as to the dissolution the commission so stated today.

Additional data is expected from Robert S. Lovett of the Union Pacific in response to telegrams sent earlier today.

In substance the message to Attorney General McReynolds says that while the commission does not believe the sale or lease of the Central Pacific to the Union Pacific is necessary or required under the terms of the order of the supreme court, it recognizes that it has no jurisdiction over such matters outside the boundaries of California. The message states that if the federal authorities require or permit the lease and sale as proposed the commission will not oppose the consummation of the deal.

The commission reiterates that any order it may make after receipt of the additional information as to the modified emerging plan will certainly embody the terms and conditions of the original
