HOUSE MEMBERS VOTE TO ABOLISH CITY WATER BOARD

(Continued from Page One.)

Omaha's dirty linen on the floor of the house. He took exception to Mike Lee's talk about the red light district having elected the delegation, and said that he and Mike ran neck and neck in that ward, and that he favored the bill.

Fighting It Out. Foster and Trumble of Sherman both spoke for the bill and as the charges were bandied back and forth, Harold moved to clear a space and let the Omaha delegation fight it out. Mockett objected and insisted the good work should go on. Smith closed the debate in favor of the bill and told the house about the taxpayers keeping up two sets of officers and that it had cost them \$25,000 to pay the water board lawyers in the last eight years. The bill was then recommended for engrossment and third reading.

The committee then took up the Dodge-Sugarman election bill which had already passed the senate. The debate was around the judiciary committee amendment providing the governor shall appoint the election commissioner.

Brain, Foster, Simon and Yates objected to the governor being the appointing power, as it was in opposition to home rule. Sugarman of the delegation favored it, as did several members out in the state. These later insisted the state was interested in Omaha elections because frequently the vote there decided the nomination of state candidates.

Richardson said Governor Shallenberger was defeated by Lullman by the Third ward vote and he cited the figures in the recent Crossman-Panorast contest to show that election frauds had been committed in Omaha. The bill was recommended to pass.

Agna Rap Keckley Bill. The Keckley freight rate bill killed yesterday on the third reading, was brought up again today and swatted for a second time. Keckley moved to reconsider the action of yesterday and Potts immediately moved to table the motion.

It was hoped that if the motion to table was carried it would take the bill to the table until it was permitted the house to bring it up at another time. Mockett insisted the motion was out of order, but it was overruled. The Potts motion was defeated. Then by a vote of 50 to 33 the Keckley motion to reconsider was defeated. Thus ends the effort to take from the railway commission its authority to regulate freight rates in Nebraska as far as the house is concerned.

The house finance committee has reported against the purchase of the Fremont Normal school.

LIQUOR BILLS ARE CONSIDERED Several Measures Are Taken Up in Upper House.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Neb., March 21.—(Special.)—Today seemed to be liquor day in the senate, or at least the morning session took on that appearance, several bills being up of a minor nature and were ordered engrossed for passed over according to the whim of the senator introducing the same.

Senate file No. 455, by Krumbach of Polk, provides that when a saloonkeeper dies, his executor may continue the business of the old stand and quench the thirst of the thirsty until the license year expires, according to the rules and regulations granted the deceased man.

Senate file No. 365, by Grace of Harlan, prescribed certain ways in which remonstrances could be brought in cities, towns and counties, but the legal luminaries of the senate saw complications arising in the amendments offered and the Harlan senator saw danger facing his bill and he asked to have the same put over until Tuesday.

One or two other bills of similar nature came up in committee of the whole during the morning. One of them, senate file No. 427, by Macfarland, caused some discussion. This bill provides that wholesalers of liquors may franchise the law in some instances and their licenses may not be revoked. The bill was withdrawn.

A resolution was read by the executive committee, signed by Victor Rosewater, chairman, and Dan Horstman, secretary, opposing the bill introduced in the legislature known as Senate File No. 37, creating a water district for Omaha, stating that the same was contrary to the spirit of the constitution, which authorizes cities to manage their own internal affairs; takes the control of the water plant from the city and places it in the hands of a board selected by a district comprising within its limits territory outside of the city, and asks that the bill be defeated.

VICE COMMISSION CONFERS WITH QUAKER GOVERNOR

HARRISBURG, Pa., March 21.—The Illinois vice commission came here today for a conference with Governor Tener. It found in the governor a champion of the cause of higher wages for women and girls, but also found that he is not in favor of some of the methods pursued in conducting the investigations.

The governor said he is heartily in favor of the appointment of commissioners to fight the white slave traffic and to improve the conditions of working girls, but he opposed any line of questioning of witnesses which would tend to reflect on the morals of working women as a class.

DEATH RECORD

James M. Smith. CEDAR FALLS, Ia., March 21.—(Special.)—James M. Smith, aged 82 years, died yesterday at 7:50 o'clock in Iowa City at the home of his sister, Mrs. Thomas Seerley, where he had lived for more than thirty-five years. President H. H. Seerley of the Iowa State Teachers' college went down in the afternoon to bring the body to Cedar Falls, where burial will be made Saturday morning. The deceased was an uncle of President Seerley.

WATER BOARD LOBBYIST ON JOB

Omaha's \$5,000 a Year Engineers Works Twenty-Four Hours Day. (From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Neb., March 21.—(Special.)—Twenty-four hours a day, is none too many for Omaha's \$5,000-a-year water board engineer-lobbyist to work against permitting the people of his proposed water district from voting on the question whether they really want to be placed under his tender control. He is not only on the floor of the house every morning and at adjournment time, but he now spends the noon hour, a few minutes continuous in eating a snack in the corridor, hobnobbing with members and preventing them from working.

Pioneer Burned to Death. ESTHERVILLE, Ia., March 21.—(Special.)—Thomas Egan, 81 years of age, was burned to death in his home near Estersburg, Ia. During the night a fire consumed his home and Mr. Egan, overcome by the smoke and flame, failed to make his escape from the burning building. He was an old and prominent settler of Palo Alto county.

FRIEDMANN'S BERLIN PATIENTS IMPROVING

NEW YORK, March 21.—Sufferers from tuberculosis whom Dr. F. F. Friedmann treated with his vaccine before his departure from Berlin to this country are responding remarkably to the treatment, according to a cablegram received today by Dr. George O'Hanlon, superintendent of Haleside hospital. The cablegram came from a Berlin physician, Dr. O'Hanlon said.

Dr. Friedmann treated sixteen patients here today, but was obliged to postpone the treatment of fourteen others until tomorrow, owing to the fact that his vaccine is exhausted. He devoted most of the day to the preparation of a new supply.

Noted Gambler Dies.

ST. PAUL, March 21.—William Griffin, for many years proprietor of a notorious gambling resort here and well known throughout the northwest, died of apoplexy today while being removed to a sanatorium. Mr. Griffin was 55 years old and came here from New York in 1888.

"SEPTEMBER MORN" IS DECLARED NOT INDECENT

CHICAGO, March 21.—"September morn," as the painting of a well known artist, depicting a young girl in the nude beside a fountain is not a lewd picture, according to the finding of a jury in the municipal court here today.

Fred D. Jackson, an art dealer was on trial for displaying in his shop's window an alleged indecent picture, which was a copy of the famous original. Among the witnesses called were a priest, several artists, an art critic, probation officers, settlement workers and persons well known in society.

Jackson was acquitted and the picture may be restored to its place in his shop window.

W. W. Hallam, member of the vice committee on the stand, said he believed the picture was indecent because it showed the girl bathing in a public place. Jackson tried to make Mr. Hallam state what part of the picture he considered indecent.

"There is no particular part," he said. "It arouses sensual feelings in ordinary people."

"Did it you?"
"Yes," was the reply.
Miss Helen E. Jewell, for many years probation officer in Evanston, admitted that she would not consider the picture immoral in the homes of her friends in Evanston.

Mrs. Gertrude Howe Britton said she considered the picture indecent.
Oliver S. Grover, an artist, made a strong statement in favor of the picture.

Walter B. Smith, an attorney, declared the picture was not indecent, but a work of art.

THREE THOUSAND FIGHT TO PRESENT PAWN TICKETS

NEW YORK, March 21.—Three thousand persons, many of whom had been there since daylight, fought to gain entrance to the pawnbroker shop of Martin Simon & Son today when the doors which had been closed since the shop was robbed of \$250,000 worth of property last Sunday, were opened to admit holders of pawn tickets.
