Collector Hammond Reports Increase in Corporation Tax Collections.

LAW WAS NOT UNDERSTOOD Consequently the Reports First Sent In Were Not According to Regulations and Had to Be

Readjusted.

Business of the corporations of the state of Nebraska has been picking up according to the corporation reports made to Ross Hammond, collector of internal

revenue for the district of Nebraska. The reports just made of profits of the various corporations show that during the year 1912 there were seventy more corporations in the state that made over \$5,000 than there were the preceding year. This means some \$15,000 more to the revenue department in corporation taxes as only those who make over \$5,000 are

The increase is due to several causes, There are more corporations doing business than there were a year ago. There are more of them making substantial profits. Another reason that may be assigned is the fact that during the three years in which the corporation tax law has been in effect there was a mistake made in the reports sent in by banks and financial institutions which showed their profits to be less than they really were. planes direct from Berlin.
