### Social Board May Show Photographs of Proper Dancing

Dancers may be taught the proper way to wiggle by the Social Service board, following suggestions made by Willard Chambers, a dancing master, who told the board at a meeting last night that it would be a wise policy to photograph dancers in approved positions and hang these photographs in public dance halls. "If this were done," said Chambers, "the dancers would have always before them photographs showing proper positions at all dances. If they persisted in dancing improperly the censors, basing their judgment on the photographs, would have little trouble in correcting them." The board is seriously considering the advisability of following the advice.

Playgrounds were discussed by the board and it was decided to make a report to the mayor asking that the city be resurveyed and arrangements be made to establish playgrounds on a plan similar to the one adopted in Kansas City. This report will later be submitted to the charter revision committee and action asked.

The robbers drank several bottles of beer and enjoyed a cold lunch before leaving the saloon with their plunder. The empty beer bottles and remnants of the lunch were found on a table by Mr. Auer upon his return to his place of business late last night.

The police believe the same men attempted to rob Joe German's saloon at Twenty-sixth and P streets. About 12 o'clock the officer on the beat heard the crash of falling glass in the rear of the saloon. He rushed around to the back of the building and found one of the windows smashed. He discovered footprints of two men in the snow near the window and reported the matter at headquarters. The window was boarded up for the night.

### Culls from the Wires

Memorial services for former Governor William Sarre were held by the Iowa legislature yesterday, Senator William S. Kenyon making the address.  
It became known tonight that Lynden Truitt, a member of the last congress from Chicago, is being strongly urged for appointment as United States commissioner of corporations.  
Fifteen prisoners confined by the militia in the coal strike district of Kanawha county, West Virginia, now under martial law, were released tonight by Governor Henry D. Hatfield.  
LONDON. A telephone message from Paris to London last night said that a carriage cleaner found under the Nord Express a satchel containing a check for 12,000,000 marks, drawn by a Berlin bank.  
The New York Greek newspaper, Atlantis, will publish today a letter from a Greek in this city which the editors of the paper say contains reliable information concerning Aleco Schinas, the assassin of King George.  
The khedive's yacht which arrived at Alexandria, Egypt, yesterday, with fugitives from Kavaia, reports having received a wireless message on March 19 saying that the Turkish cruiser Hamidieh had sunk two Greek gunboats.  
Organization of newspaper writers was the topic discussed last night by speakers at a meeting in the New York Cooper Union under the auspices of New York Newspaper Writers' Union No. 4, attended by several hundred persons.  
Baron Yun Chi-Ho, Korean, who yesterday was sentenced to six years' imprisonment at Seoul, is one of the best known English speaking Koreans. He was at one time minister of education and minister of foreign affairs in the Korean cabinet.  
Count Von Bernstorff, the German ambassador, was guest of honor last night at a dinner given by Admiral Lewishin in New York City. Mayor Gaynor and other city officials and representatives of several American universities attended.
