He brought in several witnesses who testified to the previous solicitation.

The stuff that he was selling was not nowever, restored to him. It was herd at the police station to be turned over to the federal authorities, for the reason that practically every can is a violation of the national pure food law. Labers had been removed from all of the cans and only one can in one large case was found not to have been bulged by the pressure of gases from fermentation, rendering every can polsonous, for food

All of the stuff had apparently been condemned and most of it appeared to have been gathered up from a city dump where it had been discarded as garbage. The outside of many of the cans was rusted until the tin was no longer visible One can was opened and the contentscove oysters-was found to be almost putrid.
