

SCANDAL IN NEW YORK STATE

Governor Demands Resignation of Senator Stillwell.

SAYS HE ASKED FOR BRIBE

Senator is Accused by President of New York Bank Note Company—Denies Charge Specifically.

ALBANY, N. Y., April 1.—Governor Sulzer today made a demand upon State Senator Stephen J. Stillwell of New York City that he resign. The governor acted on a complaint made by George H. Kendall, president of the New York Bank Note company, alleging that Stillwell demanded money of him to pass certain stock exchange reform legislation.

Senator Stillwell introduced the stock exchange bills recommended by Governor Sulzer and is chairman of the senate code committee, to which several of the measures were referred.

Telegram of Kendall. Governor Sulzer today made public the following telegram from Mr. Kendall: "I offer you evidence that Stillwell, the man you sent to draw my stock exchange bill, charged me \$200 for drawing it. He introduced me to Senate Revision (Lars Lewis) and asked me to send check for that amount to him and they divided the proceeds of check. I offer you evidence that Stillwell wrote me March 7 to come to his office next day and demanded \$200 each for four senate committees to report the bill out of committee.

"I said that would do no good unless the assembly committee reported it, and he said he would canvass them next day and send me a wire so that I would understand how much it would cost. I offer you evidence of the amount, namely \$1,500, in his telegram.

"I declined his proposition. He called me up next day and told me there was nothing doing unless I paid \$2,000 in advance.

"I replied I would telegraph the whole matter to you and every legislator unless he reported the bill out in twenty-four hours. He did it. Under same penalty I demanded of him that my bill be reported out of the assembly committee immediately, and it was done in forty-eight hours.

"I think I ought to let you know, anyway, if you want some hearsay evidence of the stock exchange using a large amount of money to defeat the incorporation bill I am willing to tell you what Stillwell told me. No newspaper has anything of this.

(Signed) GEORGE H. KENDALL, "President New York Bank Note Company."

"Nothing to it," Stillwell. Senator Stillwell, when shown the Kendall telegram to Governor Sulzer, said: "The fact that Mr. Kendall's telegram ends with the words 'no newspaper has anything of this,' is the best evidence of the reason why Governor Sulzer and Mr. Kendall bring out this telegram at this time.

"The hearing on the stock exchange incorporation bill takes place on Thursday afternoon before the senate judiciary committee, and I suppose Governor Sulzer imagines that the effect of this telegram will compel the judiciary committee to report his incorporation bill.

"The entire story is so false and so absurd that it is scarcely worth replying to."

The governor turned the matter and all the papers over to Attorney General Carmody with instructions to take such action as the facts warranted.

As soon as Mr. Carmody examines the memorial submitted to him by the governor and Mr. Kendall, he will turn it over to the state senate for action.

Mr. Carmody advised Governor Sulzer to demand Senator Stillwell's resignation.

STATE TREASURER GEORGE SHOWS TREASURY CONDITION

LINCOLN, April 1.—(Special.)—State Treasurer George has issued a statement of the condition of the state treasury for the month ending March 31, 1913, which shows that at the beginning of the month there was a balance on hand of \$698,302.14. The receipts for the month have been \$24,915.79 and the expenditures \$278,800.74, leaving a balance on hand of \$444,417.19, which is divided as follows: Cash on hand, \$115,527.22; cash on deposit, \$448,232.92; general fund warrants, \$7,656.05.

MADISON RAISES THREE HUNDRED DOLLARS

MADISON, Neb., April 1.—(Special Telegram.)—At a largely attended mass meeting of the citizens of Madison at Has-kins' theater last night, presided over by Mayor Fred H. Davis, \$300 was subscribed and paid over to the secretary of the meeting for relief of Omaha tornado sufferers. Draft for this amount will be sent to Robert Cowell, treasurer, at the relief committee, Omaha. The ministers of the town were made a committee to act with the mayor and secretary to continue the work of gathering funds.

GOVERNOR WILL NOT GIVE HENRY STEHR CLEMENCY

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, April 1.—(Special.)—Governor Morehead has refused to grant clemency to Henry Stehr of Madison, sent to the penitentiary on a charge of manslaughter. Stehr had a hearing before the governor about a month ago in which W. V. Allen appeared in his behalf. The evidence against Stehr showed that he had neglected to properly care for a young stepon after his feet had been frozen, and from which he later died.

BUFFALO COUNTY MAN IN TEXAS HERE ON A VISIT

ANDERSON STAYS ON THE JOB

Douglas County Member Has Been Active in Schools. (From a Staff Correspondent.)

LINCOLN, April 1.—(Special.)—Reports sifting down from Omaha indicate that when Representative Anderson shows up on the streets of that city his constituents blame him for everything the legislature does or doesn't do, which, of course, is very discouraging to the hard working Douglas county citizen. So far this session Mr. Anderson has proven one of the very hardest working first termers down here. He has brought down the wrath of some of his constituents because he threw rocks into the machinery which was grinding through a \$30,000 increase in salary for county officials; he also put blocks in front of the bill permitting the city commission to issue \$100,000 park bonds without a vote of the people, and he has also put a crimp in the bill to permit the city commission to levy \$200,000 for general fund purposes, and he landed a staggering blow on the bill to permit the commission to make a 2-mill levy for the poor house.

He is supporting the \$30,000 increase for the police and the same for the fire department. He has entered a \$100,000 appropriation for the deaf and dumb institute at Omaha, he was largely responsible for putting over the bill to abolish the Water board and save the taxpayers of Omaha from keeping up two city governments and he fathered the gas compromise bill which has been recommended for passage without opposition. He is a member of the sifting committee and as such is doing good work sitting on the water district bill and in trying to raise the bill to permit the county commissioners to feed Douglas county prisoners at cost.

Anderson has been criticised by some members of the delegation for voting against the Ferguson bill to compel the street railway company to sell seven fares for a quarter. He did this, he said, because he believed the measure unjust, and in his stand a majority of the members of the standing committee were with him.

SENATE URGES ITS COMMITTEES

Measure Creating Water Power Districts Referred Back. (From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, April 1.—(Special Telegram.)—The senate spent the afternoon in committee of the whole and ordered thirteen bills engrossed for third reading and referred S. F. 425 back to a special committee consisting of Placek, Hoagland and Saunders to fix it up. The bill is by Hoagland of Lincoln and creates water power districts. None of the other

ills was of considerable importance and at 4:30 the senate adjourned to enable some of the committees to get busy.

OMAHA BILLS THROWN OUT

Many Measures Indefinitely Postponed in House. (From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, April 1.—(Special.)—The following Omaha delegation bills were indefinitely postponed by the house this morning on recommendation of standing committees:

H. R. 553, by Yates—Employee who resigns or is discharged shall be paid within five hours. H. R. 554, by Yates—Creditors of sellers of bulk merchandise may waive right of invoice. H. R. 554, by Brain—Prohibits untruthful advertisements of business or profession. H. R. 745, by Brain—Eighteen per cent maximum rate of interest to be charged by loan sharks. H. R. 756, by Yates—Employers' liability bill: \$30,000 for expenses. H. R. 847, by Yates—Burs police officers from receiving witness fees. H. R. 552, by Yates—Permits jury trial in police court in appeal cases. H. R. 345, by Yates—Person serving out fines in city jail may work out same at rate of \$3 per day. H. R. 456, by Sugarman—Permits two justices of the peace in Omaha instead of six. H. R. 35—Persons to be legally dead if absent seven years and not heard from. H. R. 430, by Lee—Prohibits officers from lobbying for increase in salaries. H. R. 28, by Simon—Hara contributory assumed assumption of risk and fellow servant clause defense by employers in personal injury cases. H. R. 456, by Douglas Delegation—Majority report on workmen's compensation act. H. R. 472, by Brain—Allows county board to settle claim in its favor by compromise or sell claim. H. R. 775, by Simon—Permits cities of 5,000 or over to be exempt from operation of Sackett law. H. R. 732, by Simon—Parties to action in justice cases must appear at time set in summons. H. R. 353, by Simon—Constable leaving copy of a summons must in his return state where he left copy. H. R. 456, by Douglas—Limits delay in wage recovery cases in justice courts to eight days. H. R. 456, by Flanagan—Obtaining over \$15 by false pretenses a felony. H. R. 524, by Flanagan—Governor may appoint agent to return fugitives from justice to other states. H. R. 288, by Smith—Permitting correction of indictment or information before trial of cases. H. R. 462, by Smith—Employers' liability act. H. R. 371, by Smith—Regulation of trustees, guardians and others. H. R. 388, by Flanagan—Misdemeanor to trespass on railroad right-of-way. H. R. 366, by Dreusdow—Clerk or stenographer or any one interested in action may not be officer before whom depositions are taken. H. R. 456, by Person with right to mechanic's lien must furnish building owner an itemized statement within ten days after furnishing material. H. R. 784, by Dreusdow—Payment of costs in original court must be made before appeals may be taken from judgment of justices.

HOWELL AGAIN ON THE JOB

Democrat's Future at Stake If They Do Not Line Up Right. (From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, April 1.—(Special.)—Regardless of the fact that only a few more days remain for the session, and democrats of the house are working overtime in order to get some state legislation enacted in order to go home instead of holding out all summer, K. B. Howell the Omaha Water board lobbyist is engineering, is again on the job. He is hanging on to the legislators like a cocklebur. He is with them morning, noon and night and he is trying to get them to pass a bill for his own relief.

The bill is senate file No. 17 which creates a Greater Omaha water district without the people of Omaha or the towns he would absorb voting on the question. At first the bill prohibited private concerns from pumping their own water. This stirred up opposition from the South Omaha stock yards so by some kind of a combination he prepared an amendment which was adopted by the committee to eliminate the stock yards from the jurisdiction of the Water board. He now expects the stock yards people to help him get the bill through. Norton of Polk, a member of the sifting committee, has tried on two occasions to raise the bill in the sifting committee, but has been unsuccessful.

This activity on the part of Norton, who should not be interested in the bill

as it does not affect his constituents, has given rise to the general belief of the legislators that he is politically ambitious and he is working to keep the Water board mouthpiece from attacking him or his record. This sheet has threatened some members that unless they line up for the bill they may expect to be criticized for the remainder of the session, and thereafter. It is just a question now whether the democratic members of the house are real representatives of the people or politicians scared out of their boots by fear of being misrepresented or their real names printed by a democratic newspaper whose owner happens to be a United States senator absolutely at the mercy of the men his paper is now threatening.

GUN HYERS' CLAIM CUT DOWN

House Favors Measure to Establish State Reformatory. (From a Staff Correspondent.)

LINCOLN, April 1.—(Special Telegram.)—In committee of the whole the house this afternoon reduced the claim of Gus Hyers for \$2,000 to \$753. Hyers wanted the money to pay the expenses of his defense of a charge of having participated in the killing of Roy Blunt allowing the outbreak at the state penitentiary. The bill appropriating \$100,000 for a state reformatory was also recommended for passage, as was the bill to appropriate \$50,000 for an armory at Nebraska City. Speaker Kelley tried to amend the reformatory measure by having it located at Grand Island. The amendment was defeated and the institution will be located by the State Board of Control.
