KENNEDY TALKS TO THE HOUSE Bill as Prepared Gives Counties Power to Call Special Elections to Vote Million in Cases

of Dimnter. A bill giving countles authority to call special elections to vote bonds in the sum of \$1,000,000 or less in vases of disaster will be passed by the Nebraska legislature, according to John L. Kennedy, chairman of the committee appointed by Casper E. Yost of the Commercial club with instructions to wait upon the governor and explain the bill as drafted

Governor Morehead wift send the bill songs and hopes to give an entertainment to the legislature with recommendation that it pass, says Chairman Kennedy. At first the governor demurred as to the recommendation, but promised to sign the bill if it passes.

Ten of the committee walted on the governor yesterday. They returned last night after holding a conference with the governor and securing a hearing before The entire Douglas county delegation

will support the bill, although Anderson, Smith and Davis withheld their decision until they had heard the bill explained. "Anderson, Smith and Davis opposed the bill until they had heard it fully explained," said Kennedy. "There may still be some difference of opinion as to details, but as the bill stands it will pass the legislature.

"We called on the governor in the foreoon. After we had discussed the measure with him he said he would send it over with recommendation that is pass." "As we came out of the governor's office we met Davis, Anderson and Smith have been doing excellent guard work in going in.
