WILL PASS BILL FOR BONDS

Douglas County Delegation Stands Solidly for It.

KENNEDY TALKS TO THE HOUSE

Bill as Prepared Gives Counties Power to Call Special Elections to Vote Millions in Cases of Disaster.

A bill giving counties authority to call special elections to vote bonds in the sum of \$1,000,000 or less in cases of disaster will be passed by the Nebraska legislature, according to John L. Kennedy, chairman of the committee appointed by Casper E. Toft of the Commercial club with instructions to wait upon the governor and explain the bill as drafted.

Governor Morehead will send the bill to the legislature with recommendation that it pass, says Chairman Kennedy. At first the governor demurred as to the recommendation, but promised to sign the bill if it passes.

Ten of the committee waited on the governor yesterday. They returned last night after holding a conference with the governor and securing a hearing before the legislature.

The entire Douglas county delegation will support the bill, although Anderson, Smith and Davis withheld their decision until they had heard the bill explained. "Anderson, Smith and Davis opposed the bill until they had heard it fully explained," said Kennedy. "There may still be some difference of opinion as to details, but as the bill stands it will pass the legislature."

"We called on the governor in the forenoon. After we had discussed the measure with him he said he would send it over with recommendation that it pass." "As we came out of the governor's office we met Davis, Anderson and Smith going in. The governor suggested that before we had asked for his favorable recommendation the Douglas county delegation be invited to see him."

"At noon we met with the Douglas delegation and discussed the bill. Davis held out longest, but at last he favored the bill."

"We went over to the house in the afternoon and the rules were suspended, and I was given fifteen minutes in which to explain the bill. At the conclusion of my explanation there seemed to be no serious objection to the bill, and I believe it will be passed."

Members of the committee who called on the governor were: John L. Kennedy, chairman; J. A. C. Kennedy, R. C. Peters, C. T. Kountze, George A. Magney, John A. Rine, C. C. George, C. M. Wilhelm, H. Dooly and C. C. Belden.

Whether the committee will go east and attempt to interest capital in the \$1,000,000 bond proposition, without trouble should an election be called and the proposition carry, Mr. Kennedy could not say.

As the bill now stands, it gives any county in the state authority to call a special election and vote bonds to the extent of \$1,000,000 for the use of the sufferers in case of disaster. The handling of the money, the manner in which it will be expended and under what special circumstances are left largely to the county which shall vote the bonds.

General Relief Fund Now \$170,246, With More Added Hourly

The total in the general relief fund at noon today was \$170,246.58, according to the report made by Treasurer Cowell. More money is coming in at every mail.

MANY ARTICLES BLOWN ACROSS THE MISSOURI

Thousands of articles blown from Omaha homes by Sunday's tornado are being found along the territory west of the Ilimekin road north of Council Bluffs. The tornado expended its fury in Omaha, and by the time it had reached the Iowa shore of the river it was a widely scattered wind, bearing along all the lighter debris that had been carried high in the whirling cloud.

Articles of every conceivable description have been found scattered over the country, clinging to the trees and bushes and rolled up on the ground. Many are of value. Scores of hats for men and women have been picked up, several of the latter with valuable ostrich plumes. One hat was picked up yesterday that had a \$30 undamaged plume on it. Many silk dresses and fine garments, soiled and encased in mud, have been found. A man's silk shirt, containing valuable gold cuff buttons and diamond studs was found yesterday near the Ilimekin road.

People living in that vicinity have been making finds that have added many articles to their wealth. Yesterday crowds of men and boys from Council Bluffs were seeking the wind-blown household treasures and clothing of their unfortunate neighbors this side of the river, but no instance has yet been reported where they have sought to restore recovered goods to their owners. It was said last evening literally wagonloads of lace curtains and window blinds are scattered over that part of the country.

FORMER MAYOR OF BENSON DIES AT A LOCAL HOSPITAL

C. A. Tracy, former mayor of Benson and well known tobacco dealer, died at noon at the Wise Memorial hospital from blood poisoning, which had affected both legs. He was 54 years old and is survived by a wife and child.

Mr. Tracy had been sick only three weeks. His demise was unexpected, although his condition was critical. About three weeks ago Mr. Tracy bruised his leg on the step of a street car while alighting. The bruise became infected and blood poisoning set in. He was in the hospital just a week.
