Prominent Men in Attendance at the Cost Congress Meet

Mrs. Anna F. Harmon, the famous printer of Leavenworth, Kan., sent word to the reception committee that she would be unable to attend the convention. There was a great deal of disappointment when this news was spread around among the delegates.

Mrs. Harmon has always been an interesting figure at the conventions of the congress. She is a cost enthusiast, having been one of the first to take up the new system, and every chance she gets at a meeting of printers she tells of the work of the system as carried out in her shop. She always has a message and is able to deliver it well.

Mrs. Harmon was to have talked at the first afternoon session on "The A. B. C. Cost System." She was also on the program of the banquet to be given the visiting printers at the Paxton hotel Tuesday night.

James Carpenter, representative of the Carpenter Paper company at Kansas City, was one of the early arrivals at convention headquarters. Early in the morning he gathered together a number of visitors, and in an automobile took them for a ride over the city. He was anxious to see the tornado district before the clean up had been finished and despite the rain of the morning he went for the ride.

There are twenty delegates from Kansas City and ten from St. Joseph attending the convention. Other good sized delegations are expected from Des Moines, Lincoln, Columbus, Beatrice, Ashland and Fremont.

Tom Bateman of Hamilton, O., national supervisor of stunts, Pica, was seriously handicapped in getting to the convention, but nevertheless he was one of the earliest ones on the job. He left Hamilton Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock and took a roundabout course to get away from the floods. The Pennsylvania railroad took him from Hamilton to Cincinnati. From Cincinnati to Louisville he rode the Louisville & Nashville and from there he reached Chicago at 1:15 o'clock Sunday afternoon. He was seventy-two hours getting to Omaha from his home town, and the trip cost him \$12. Bateman is a star performer in the Order of Picas.

Press Kennedy of Kansas City was also one of the early arrivals. His face is a familiar one at all conventions of printers, and he did not disappoint this time. Kennedy is known as the ex-national chaser of the Picas. Some members say he is still a good chaser, being able to qualify in chasing anything.

Gene Turner, national scratcher of Pica, did not get his name in the early reports of the convention and there are some who declare a little publicity is necessary in his case. Turner is one of the principal speakers of the Cost congress. He first appears on the program of the first afternoon meeting with "Impressions" and will give a second performance at the banquet Tuesday night. He is said to be a brilliant entertainer.

Eleven candidates for membership in Pica are mixing in the company of the convention, wearing long yellow badges for identification purposes. Their initiation is expected to be the feature show of the Pica meetings. At the theater party it is announced they "will get theirs" for there is to be "doin's between the acts."

Ed A. Sheasgreen of Chicago, secretary of the Pen Franklin club of America, sent word that he would be late getting to Omaha. He will talk before the convention Tuesday afternoon on "Pen Franklin vs. Gunpowder."

Frank I. Elleck has done so much for the relief of the tornado victims that he is almost too tired to participate to any great extent in the festivities of the visiting printers. He is expected to be on the job at most of the sessions, however, and will appear Tuesday morning for a chalk talk on the cost system, on which he has become expert.

Sam Rees, Jr., is said to have memorized a lot of new jokes which he will spring on the printers at the banquet Tuesday night. He is named as toastmaster for this occasion and everybody is expecting the development in Omaha of a Chauncey Depew.



A hoist that will lift 3,000 pounds with a 10 year old boy at the crank. Put a hoist at each press in the plant. Table trucks are interchangeable. Put in as many table trucks as your stock requires. Any one of them can be hoisted any time to any press equipped with a hoist. Place stock on table truck as it comes in. Never re-plate it till it goes through the press.

Use a table truck to pile stock on as it comes from the fly table. Hoist it and make the second run. Run it to the stock room or folder, at your pleasure without rehandling it.

Dry racks may be used on the table truck and the entire load placed in the dry room or hoisted and fed again without re-plate.
