In spite of this there was considerable activity in the trade and the big bulk changed hands in good season in the morning, practically everything being cleaned out by midday.

Beef steers were in good demand and sold quite freely, but advices from Chicago indicated at the opening a decline of 10670c naturally made buyers weak in their views and the market here was

RAILROAD DECISIONS TO **BE ANNOUNCED TODAY**

WASHINGTON, April 6 -- Many im portant decisions are expected from the supreme court tomorrow, when it reconvenes after a two week's recess. More than 100 cases are under consideration. Among the more important ones in which decisions may be announced are the railroad rate cases from Minnesota and five other states; the "inter-mountain" rate cases, involving the constitutionality of the "long and short haul clause" of the Interstate Commerce commission act; the "turpentine trust" case, involving the constitutionality of the Sherman anti-trust law as a criminal measure; the "newspaper publicity case," involving the constitutionality of the federal law, requiring publicity as to the stockholders, bondhelders and circulation of newspapers, and the California oil land cases, in which all the transcontinental railroads are vitally concerned.
