Agricultural Bill Change Committee of Iowa Legislature Introduces Measure for Reform.

LOBBY COMES IN FOR INQUIRY

Highway Committee Looks Into Matter and Summons Witnesses, but Fails to Find Evidence of Material Corruption.

(From a Staff Correspondent.)

DES MOINES, April 7.—(Special.)—The senate for the reorganization of the department of agriculture embodied in a committee bill just introduced in the legislature is the most revolutionary in character of anything of the sort ever presented. The bill has been under preparation a long time and was presented following the report of the committee on retirement and reform of the present legislature.

IT IS PROPOSED

that actual authority and power shall be vested in a commission of three persons who shall go on salary and devote their entire time to the senate. They shall be appointed by the governor subject to confirmation by the senate.

THIS COMMISSION SHALL HAVE SUPERVISOR

over all the departments referred to in the bill, shall engage in the promotion of agriculture, provide for agricultural education and animal industry, shall investigate as to the improvement of methods, appliances and machinery and the use of devitalization of crops and products, shall disseminate information as to horticulture, forestry and manufactures, control the weather bureau and investigate as to the prevalence of contagious diseases, etc.

THE COMMISSION SHALL CO-OPERATE

with all associations having to do with these things and direct the expenditure of the money for all of them.

THERE SHALL BE AN ADVISORY BOARD

formed of the present State Board of Agriculture with some additions.

THE MANAGEMENT OF THE STATE FAIR

shall be under the board and the secretary may have a salary not to exceed \$2,000.

LOBBY AND THE LEGISLATURE.

The legislative assembly, which is now drawing to a close, has had a peculiar experience with the troublesome lobby question. There has been a considerable lobby present at all times representing various interests, but not a larger number of hangers on than usual. Early in the session, owing to a sharp division on the plans for road legislation, the special interests desiring radical road legislation, started the story that there was a bridge lobby at work to defeat their plans for road legislation. As a result of this they procured the passage of the following resolution:

THAT THE COMMITTEE ON ROADS

and highways of the house of representatives or the joint committee on roads and highways of the house of representatives and senate is hereby authorized and directed to make investigation into the methods and practices of bridge companies and all persons, firms or corporations furnishing road and bridge material or contracting work on bridges and highways of this state, and to that end said committee on roads and highways of the house of representatives or said joint committee on roads and highways of the senate is hereby authorized to subpoena and exercise all authority and to provide for the payment of all expenses incurred incident thereto as authorized in sections 21 and 22 of the code.

ACCORDING TO AN INVESTIGATION

was made into the matter by the highways committee and two or three witnesses were summoned, but nothing was discovered to show there was or had been any large bridge lobby present. The representatives of one small bridge company had appeared and had advocated certain matters before the legislators, but beyond that there was nothing doing.

AN INQUIRY INTO A MORE GENERAL

corporate lobby also failed to disclose anything very sensational and the matter has apparently been dropped. The greater part of the lobbying has been done by

Insurance in Smaller Amounts. The senate has passed a bill providing that contracts in cases where the amount of property involved is as low as \$10,000. The present limit is \$25,000. The idea is to permit insurance on smaller amounts in Iowa.
