The street railway company has sent a check for \$4,500 to Treasurer Hall of the street car company relief committee, and G. W. Wattleis has given \$500 to the same fund. J. P. GUTH TO BE AWARDED ENGINE HOUSE CONTRACT

J. P. Guth will be awarded the contract for constructing a new engine house for the city. The department at Sixteenth and Isard streets when the council convenes Tuesday. The cost of the new house will be \$25,000.

Negotiations are under way between the city and the Byron Reed Real Estate company to purchase a lot at Twelfth and Dodge, southwest corner, for \$11,400 for a new engine house site.

City Commissioner Withnell will recommend the purchase. If the deal closes through a new engine house will be built there, the house at 211 South Tenth street being abandoned and the lot sold to a company which has offered \$5,000 for it, with permission for the city to use the house until October without rent, the rent after October to be \$50 a month.
