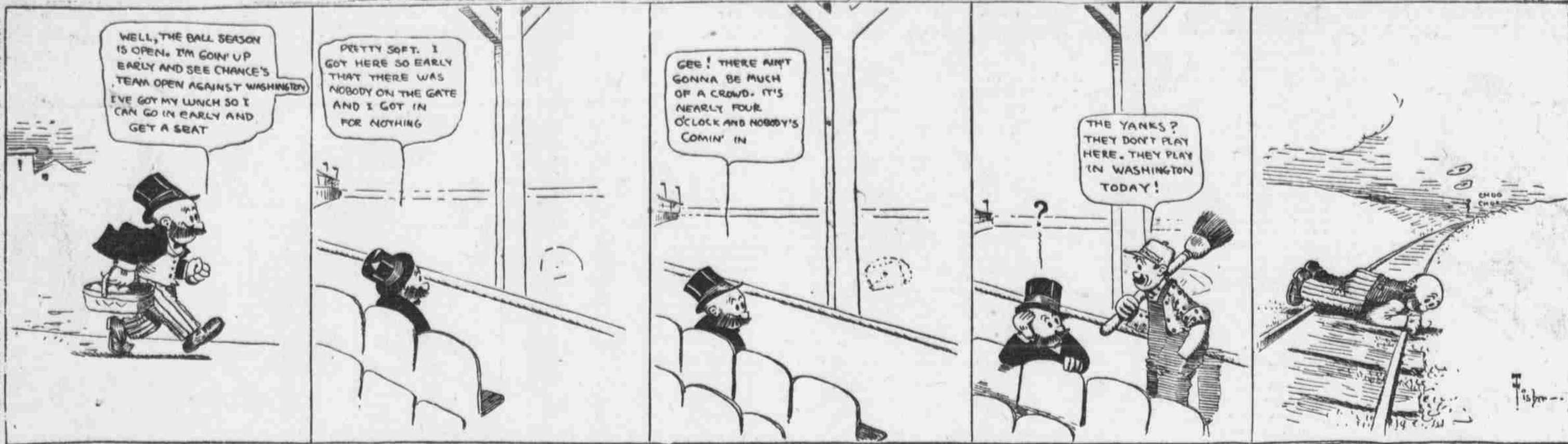

ROURKES COME HOME TODAY

PRACTICE THIS AFTERNOON

The Omaha base ball team will stream into the Union depot this morning at 11 o'clock from Oklahoma City, where, for the last twenty-five days, they have been preparing for the 1913 championship race of the Western league.

In the afternoon the entire squad will embark for Rourke park, where a practice game will be held between the regulars and Yanganigans.

In the afternoon another practice game will be held and the same program will be observed Thursday. Rourke at first thought of giving his men a rest Thursday, but owing to the fact that all yesterday was lost in traveling, the Omaha magnate believes it wise to keep the players keyed up.
