

### FALLS CITY ASKS STATION

Merits of Situation to Come Before Railroad Commission.

### HEARING TO BE HELD MAY FIRST

Uniform Packing of Eggs, Asked for by Creameries and Commission Houses, Will Be Up to the Board Later.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, April 15.—(Special.)—The fight at Falls City for a union passenger station will be heard before the Railway commission on May 1, when the right of the commission to force the building of a union station will be invoked. The Burlington and Missouri Pacific roads are the ones affected by the order, if the commission rules in favor of the petitioners. A. J. Weaver of Falls City appeared before the commission this morning and on his motion May 1 was set for the hearing. The two present stations are a mile or more apart and one of them some distance from the business center, and the effort is made in order to make the depot more easily accessible. Another matter before the commission is the uniform packing of eggs, asked for by the creameries and commission houses. They ask the railway commission to issue such orders as will bring the matter to a more substantial and uniform basis, so as to expedite handling. The hearing will be before the commission on May 2.

### State Hunts Property.

The fever of investigation which has prevailed in the present legislature has incited Governor Morehead, and after the legislature is off his hands he expects to do a little investigating himself. In fact, he has had whispered in his ear that several of the state institutions will show up evidence that the state has been deprived of some of its property and that said property now reposes in the homes of former employes or appointees in said institutions.

### Thompson Will Not Accept Any Office

GRAND ISLAND, April 15.—(Special.)—In an interview given out here today W. H. Thompson, chairman of the democratic state committee, declares that he will remain in Grand Island and continue his law practice and he where he can look more closely after his business interests. Mr. Thompson indicates that after looking over Washington for two weeks and after a thorough and very pleasant acquaintance with nearly all of the different departments in Washington, he had decided to remain in Nebraska. While the announcement of his appointment as solicitor of the Treasury department was a little premature, the office was tendered him, as were several other nominations.

### EDITOR POLCAR EXPLAINS

Tells Court What He Meant by the Articles Published.

### PROGRESS OF ESTELLE'S SUIT

Director of Daily News Asked to Give Construction of Sentences and Phrases that Appear in Print.

FREMONT, Neb., April 15.—(Special Telegram.)—The libel case of Judge Estelle against the Omaha Daily News and H. E. Fellman progressed a little more rapidly yesterday. Objections were as numerous as before, but there was less argument over them. Editor Joseph Polcar of the News was on the stand during most of the afternoon session. On direct examination he testified that he never intended to and did not charge the plaintiff with either malice, misfeasance or corruption in office; that the meaning he intended to convey was that the judge felt friendly to the Third ward crowd, and that by reason of such acquaintance and friendship his judicial actions were likely to be biased in their favor. He disclaimed any personal ill will toward the plaintiff. The Fellman letter, he said, appeared only in the home edition of the paper, which then had a circulation of about 15,000.

After recess Mr. Mahoney took him in hand for a rigorous cross-examination. The letter, he admitted, was addressed to the voters of Douglas, Washington, Hurt and Sarpy counties, and also appeared as an advertisement in other editions.

**Explaining an Article.** Mr. Mahoney showed him a copy of the News of April 10, containing a two-column set-up of the trial on the front page, which he said had that place because it was more important to the people of the state than the election of a district judge in Omaha. Mr. Mahoney then took up the article, clause by clause, and interrogated the witness as to what particular construction he put on them. At times he was in pretty tight places to give a construction which was not in line with that claimed by the plaintiff. When he reached that part charging "collaboration of courts with thieves and gamblers in the temple of justice," Judge Hollenbeck thought Mr. Mahoney had gone far enough and sustained Judge Baxter's objection. Mr. Mahoney also called the attention of the home edition of the News on August 14, 1912, was over 23,000.

The arguments will begin soon after court convenes tomorrow morning, and the case will probably not reach the jury until Wednesday morning.

(Continued from Page One.) Each of these acts is now a law and in force in this state. Included in the list is a 15 per cent reduction in freight rates, a 20 per cent reduction in express rates, a law to tax terminal property of railroads for city purposes, a pure food act, a primary law, and many others involving questions which would stagger this legislature to even attempt to comprehend. If the 1907 legislature was repudiated by the people, these members of this session who violated their platform pledges and who voted against the proposition of letting the people rule, if they have any imagination, may easily imagine what is in store for them. Of course, the legislature of 1907 has been criticized for some of its acts, especially the primary law under which this nondescript aggregation of law makers was nominated.

### SAUNDERS CHANGES HIS TUNE

Asks for Home Rule on Saloon Bill and Doesn't Get It.

LINCOLN, Neb., April 15.—(Special.)—A little echo of the legislation which resulted in the passage of senate file No. 17, the Omaha water bill, was heard in the senate this morning when senate file No. 38, introduced by Saunders, providing for a change in the Stocumb law which would enable the people of Omaha to vote on the proposition of the time for closing and opening saloons, was brought up.

In speaking in favor of the bill, Saunders said that it was along the lines of legislation passed at the session giving the people of any community the right to vote on matters in which they themselves were interested and was along the line of home rule for Omaha.

House rule No. 24, a bill to establish a reformatory, called for an appropriation of \$100,000, but on motion of Talcott this was cut to \$75,000. An amendment by Placker carried that in selecting a location for the institution the board "may" locate where there is the right kind of clay suitable for the manufacture of brick for paving.

Appropriation bills took up most of the time of the senate, \$90,000 being voted for new buildings and improvements at the state penitentiary; \$30,000 for printing the new statutes; and \$5,000 for a new reformatory for young and first-time prisoners. A bill allowing county commissioners to appoint a county farm demonstrator upon a petition of 10 per cent of the freeholders of a county was also ordered engrossed for third reading. Cox's resolution calling on the railway commission to cease to grant preferential rates to towns by railway companies was discussed. Bushee opposed the resolution, as being too deep a question for the senate to take up at this time and in this he was ably seconded by T. G. 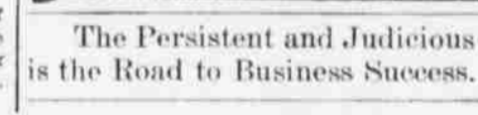

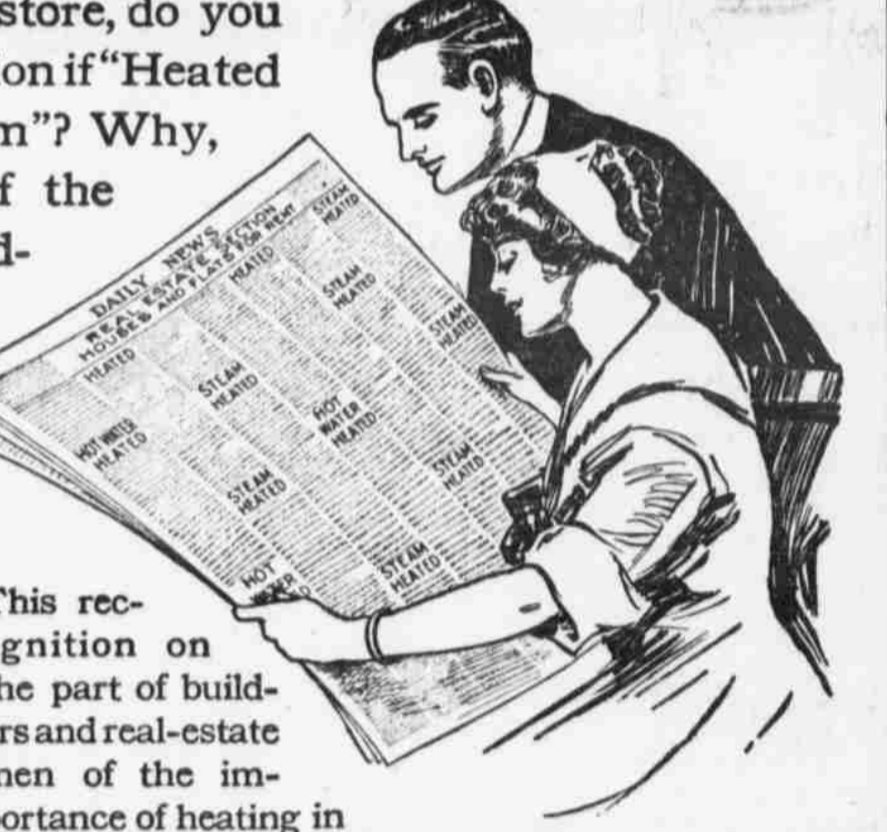
