DIETZ VIEWS TORNADO ZONE

Tells of the Early Reports of Storm in European Papers.

THE BEE GIVES HIM THE DATA Says in Thousands of Miles of Travel He Never Missed Getting a Copy of The Bee for Each Day He Was Away.

"I drove over the tornado stricken district this morning," said C. N. Dietz, who with his wife just returned from a five months' trip in Africa and Europe. "The sight is something awful, and I can see that a great deal has been cleaned up, rebuilt and repaired. One could not imagine that so much damage could be done in so short a time. You can see that the streets that were struck and about my relatives. Well, talk about efficiency. In a short time these people practically laid a map before me showing what streets were struck and the general path of the tornado. They also gave me the information that my brother's home was destroyed, but that the family were safe."

Mr. and Mrs. Dietz were in the south of France when the news came of the tornado in Omaha. "The reports carried by the first papers in France and London," says Mr. Dietz, "were something awful. The report was that the town was wiped out of existence, and that 10,000 people were killed. We could get no word from home at first, of course, so we hurried to Paris, where I went to the Paris office of the New York Herald and asked them to find out something about the streets that were struck and about my relatives. Well, talk about efficiency. In a short time these people practically laid a map before me showing what streets were struck and the general path of the tornado. They also gave me the information that my brother's home was destroyed, but that the family were safe."

Early Accounts Almost Ludicrous.

"If it had not been so serious it would have been ludicrous to read the first foreign papers concerning the tornado. One of the London papers gave a half column description of tornadoes, their character, causes and actions. It then told that Omaha, a prosperous and growing young city of the central part of the United States, had been completely wiped off the map. It said that not a vestige of the city was left to tell the tale. Editorially the same paper then went on to moralize on the fact that England has no such terrible freaks of weather as tornadoes. England, through that editorial, congratulated herself on her good fortune. The editorial then remarked: 'But, we doubt not that through the courageous spirit of the American people a greater and grander city will rise from the ruins of Omaha.'"

Mr. Dietz says the first detailed authentic information he received from Omaha was when The Omaha Bee reached him nine days after it was printed Monday morning in Omaha. "It was through the courtesy of Victor White that I got this and it was through his intimate knowledge of the best boat and the quickest mail service that I got it so soon. It gave a good early estimate of the dead and injured and the property loss and gave the list of names so that I knew exactly what the situation was. I never missed an issue of The Bee from the time I left Omaha in the middle of November until I got back. Even when we journeyed 3,000 miles up the Nile in that wild country of Africa I got the paper regularly."

COURT HOUSE ROW IN COURT

Commissioners Think They Are Safe from Law Suits.

ATTORNEYS WANT THEIR FEES

Bank is Willing to Pay the Funds It Holds Into Court to Let the Judge Decide Where the Money Goes.

The Caldwell & Drake row has been thrown into court after months of wrangling, but the county escapes being forced into litigation. Agreement to pay \$47,603.30 after local creditors are paid out of the \$20,000 warrant delivered to the court house builders last week and an additional \$150 after the appraisement on the north side of the building are completed, made Monday night by the Board of County Commissioners, leaves the board, it is believed, safe from lawsuits.

Stout & Rose, former attorneys for the attempt to seize \$5,000 lawyers' fees of contractors, have come into court in an attempt to collect. The United States National Bank, where the money was deposited by Morrow Bros. of the bonding company, to whom it was assigned, has caused the battle of the creditors to come before Judge Troup next Saturday, when an application for a permanent injunction forbidding Stout & Rose, Morrow Bros. or Caldwell & Drake from making attempts to gain possession of the money, will be heard. A temporary injunction was granted this morning for the same purpose.

The bank wants to pay \$15,000, which remains in its possession, to the court and let the judge decide who is entitled to it. If the judge should decide for Stout & Rose this would again hold up final payment by the county, for some of the local creditors then would go unpaid.

Packing Company is Sued by Woman for Nervous Trouble

Lena Teschack, a young woman formerly employed by Swift & Co., alleges in a petition filed in district court that on January 13, while ascending a dark stairway at 6:46 o'clock in the morning, she was seized by the lower part of the leg by a man whom she is unable to identify. She says that she was so frightened and tried so hard to get away that in her struggle she fell from the stairway and was bruised and injured. As a consequence of the experience she alleges that she has suffered from nervous prostration.

The plaintiff asks \$3,000 from the packing company in South Omaha, alleging that it failed to keep the stairway leading to the upper floors of the plant lighted and that the man who grabbed her by the ankle was an employee.

That it has long been the custom for men supposed responsible for the illuminating of the stairway to secret themselves under it in the darkness and to annoy girls and women climbing upward to their work is alleged. Lena Teschack says she was not aware of this at the time. She was employed in the sausage department on the second floor.
