



IOWA GIRL INHERITS HALF OF BIG FARM

STOUX FALLS, S. D., April 18.—(Special)—By the terms of a will filed in the probate court in StouX Falls, Miss Gwendolen Moore Garey, at present a student in a college at Grinnell, Ia., is given one-half interest in a Minnesota county farm which is valued at \$5,000. The will is that of Mrs. Albert C. Ross, who died in January at Long Beach, Cal. Miss Garey was her niece and during the last ten years has been a member of the Ross household. The farm which Mrs. Ross owned at the time of her death, and which by the terms of her will is left equally to her husband and niece, consists of 385 acres, highly improved, and is situated six miles east of Dell Rapids.

Mr. Ross has been spending the winter at Audubon, Ia., but in the near future will return to California.

JOHN WAYMAN ENDS LIFE

Well Known Attorney Dies Result of Self-Inflicted Wounds.

DESPONDENT OVER ILL HEALTH

Hemorrhage of Lungs Immediate Cause—Was Prominent Because of His Activity in Lorimer Scandal.

CHICAGO, April 18.—John E. W. Wayman, former state's attorney of Cook county and candidate for the republican nomination for governor at the last primary, who shot himself in his home here this afternoon, died tonight. Death was caused by hemorrhage of the lungs. Mr. Wayman had been sinking steadily since the shooting.

Wayman fired two bullets into his body at his residence at 3:30 today. The cause ascribed was a nervous breakdown, due to ill health.

He had but recently retired from office and had gone into a law partnership with a former assistant. He had been conspicuous in his term in office in the prosecution of men accused of bribery in connection with the election of William Lorimer as United States senator, had been active at the close of his incumbency in closing the vice district in Chicago and had undergone a strain in an unsuccessful campaign for the republican nomination for governor.

For several weeks his physicians had warned him that unless he quit work entirely he undoubtedly would die. Yesterday he sought a physician at a hotel and received similar advice. He became greatly discouraged and went to a hospital. He remained at the institution two hours and then went home, where he passed a sleepless night. He arose this morning, but did not dress.

Later this afternoon he turned a revolver upon himself sending two bullets into his body below the heart.

Efforts of the family to conceal the facts of the attempted suicide resulted in the spread of sensational rumors that Wayman had been assassinated by some criminal.

Physicians said tonight that there was a slight chance for his recovery.

Mr. Wayman shot himself with an automatic pistol, the property of one of his clients, who had killed a man with the weapon.

He was working on the case at his home and had the weapon before him with other exhibits in the case. When Mrs. Wayman heard the shots, she ran to his room, but could not see him. She threw open the closet door and found Mr. Wayman lying on the floor with the pistol beside him.

"Doctor, you should have been with me. I certainly have made a fool of myself," were Mr. Wayman's first words to Dr. W. C. Krohn, who was summoned.

been rapid and complete, numerous farms along the Peru and Nemaha bottoms having been completely washed away.

Apparently the river is changing its course. Since the water began to fall, the current has been setting hard against the Iowa shore a few miles below Folsom. At that point it formed a perfect elbow and shot out against the rich bottom on the Nebraska side, carrying everything before it, and in some instances cutting inland half a mile within twenty-four hours.

Down below Nebraska City for several miles the tracks of the Burlington have been moved back against the bluffs, and in places where prior to the recent overflow they were half a mile or more from the river bank, the grade has been entirely washed away.

On the bottom, below Bellevue and north of Plattsmouth, the river has cut across from the Iowa side and is doing some damage, but not so much as farther down the stream. It is also reported that on the Iowa side of the river, opposite Plattsmouth, considerable damage

has been done and several farms washed away.

A rumor has reached the Burlington offices to the effect that the permanent work done by the company and the government, just above Folsom, has been washed out, but this has not been verified. There was also a rumor that this work had been dynamited, but the railroad officials took no stock in the report, saying that if it was true they would have heard of it, even though that portion of the road is under the jurisdiction of the superintendent at Creston, Ia.

BURLINGTON PLANS NEW LINE

One of the Burlington, in automobiles, made the trip across Wyoming from Sheridan to Casper, and last summer three surveys were made, it being given

out at the time that an easy grade had been found and that a road down through the valleys on the east side of the Big Horn range could be constructed at a comparatively small cost. There the matter rested until now.

In connection with the other lines that the Burlington is building in Wyoming this is said to be a part of a gigantic scheme that the Hill people have under consideration and are rapidly developing.

That the Burlington is to push construction of the line from Powder River to Orin Junction and thence on east into Omaha has become more apparent by reason of the fact that the general contractors, Traubey Bros. of Portland, Ore., have begun work on nearly every mile of grade between Orin Junction and Casper. Last Sunday camps were established along the entire distance and Monday morning 600 teams and more than 1,000 men commenced work.
