PENITENTIARY FOR TRIO

Bad Men Taken to State Institution to Serve Sentences.

HELD UP MANY IN OMAHA

Were Active in the Spring Holding Up Pedestrians and Committing a Number of Bold Robberies.

Jack ("Scarface") Connors, "Duddy" Richardson, alias Charles Hildebrand, and Thomas Conrad, the three safeblowers arrested in Des Moines March 19 for "jobs" in Omaha, were taken to the penitentiary at Lincoln this morning to serve indeterminate sentences of from one to ten years at hard labor, imposed by Judge Sutton in district court.

from the county jail, where they had been confined since they were brought to Omaha.

Innocent Man Released.

T. C. Sims, who was innocently involved into the dynamiting and holdup plots of the three young bandits, was also taken from the jail, but it was by his wife and child instead of by deputy sheriffs.

Mrs. Sims' son came to the jail with his mother, and as she walked up the stairs leading to the outer corridor she saw her husband, for he was a "trustee" and was not confined in the "bull pen."

"Come with me; you're free," she told him. "No, it must be the trial," he answered, doubting his good fortune, though his face was joyful.

"The county attorney has dismissed the case," said Mrs. Sims. "Oh, hurry!"

Sims quickly changed his prison uniform for his own suit of clothes, declining to kiss his wife or son till he had done so. Then there was a happy and sympathetic reunion.

"I have been nearly crazy," said Sims. "My wife was not good health, and I have worried about her."

Pleads Not Guilty.

Sims pleaded not guilty before Judge Sutton and had been remanded to await trial. County Attorney Magney, however, was convinced that he had done nothing intentionally wrong and dismissed the charge of breaking and entering which stood against him. Sims was held in jail like the others on failure to secure \$1,500 bail imposed in police court March 24. He has no employment now, his wife said, but will not be long in securing it.

The other three men were said by the police to have been responsible for holdups which occurred nightly in this city in the early part of March and also to

have blown a safe in the north part of town.

Arrested in Des Moines.

When they were arrested in East Des Moines they threw away a suitcase containing dynamite, fuses, four revolvers, soap, nitroglycerin "soup" and two pieces of bologna bearing the tags of Henry Schnauber's meat market, at which place a safe was blown and \$200 stolen. The money was afterward recovered.

"Duddy" Richardson had a bullet wound in his left shoulder, which indicated that he was the holdup shot at two weeks previously by Cyrus Bowman. All of the three were under 25 years of age.

Two clues discovered by the Omaha police after the Schnauber safeblowing led to the arrests. A large quantity of bologna was missing and a detective reported that a local police character had sent a dog to Sims in Des Moines. The Des Moines police were notified and they succeeded in rounding up the gang.

Sims Made Confession.

Sims told all he knew after he was brought back to Omaha. It was a case of associating with bad company. He said that the other three men, together with the wives of Hildebrand and Connors, roomed at his home a few days prior to March 11. On the night of March 11 he looked into Conrad's suitcase and discovered several dynamite caps, fuses, cotton, soap and nitroglycerin. He did not mention his find to the roomers.

That night they left about 10 o'clock. He went to bed. At 5 o'clock the next morning he was preparing to go to work when Conrad came in and gave Sims \$15 and asked him to bring the women to Des Moines, as he had found good jobs there.

Sims said he overheard the trio talking in Des Moines about blowing the safe

in a butcher shop in Omaha at Twenty-fourth and Parker streets. He ended by telling of their arrest.

Although the committee has several times announced that it has all the clothing it needs some boxes of clothing are still coming in by freight and express every day.

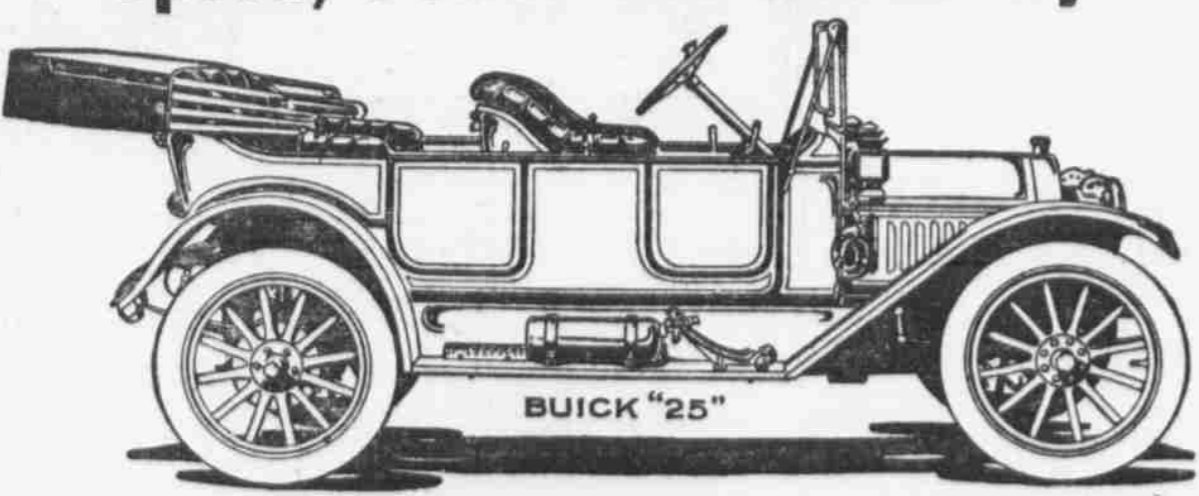
from injuries received when he was struck by a Burlington engine September 22, 1912, was due to his having become intoxicated by drinking liquor sold to him by the defendant.
