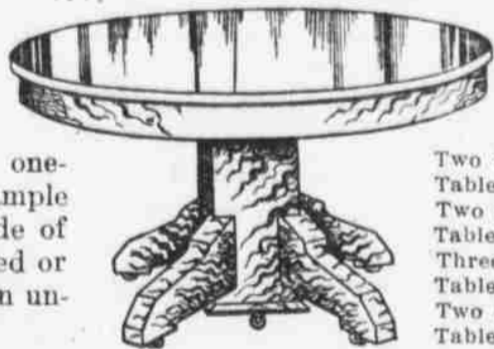

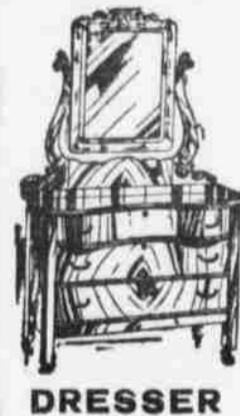

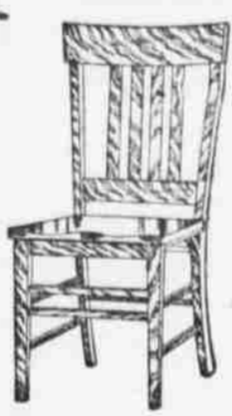

Asked to Find Taylor—Request has been received by the police from Hartford, S. D., to find Ralph Taylor, aged 22 years, whose mother died there several days ago. Taylor can get railroad transportation from Chief of Police Dunn by applying at his office.

Seek Missing People—The police department is trying to find the following missing people: Edward Hitt, Frank Hiran of Nashville, Tenn.; Joe Caton of Griswold, Ia.; Elias Lee, Viola Baeger, Carl Harris of Erie, Pa.; Emory McCogden and family.

To Vaccinate Pupils at Lake School—All pupils of the third, seventh and eighth grades of Lake school will be vaccinated to prevent a contagion of smallpox. Joe Peterson, father of one of the pupils attending this school, is ill with smallpox, and through his child others have been exposed. At least 115 pupils will be vaccinated.

Beal Asks Divorce—Mrs. Mary D. Beal, thirty years a resident of Douglas county, has brought suit for divorce against her husband, H. H. Beal of South Omaha, alleging cruelty and non-support. The couple was married in Omaha June 20, 1881. They have six children, two of whom are minors. Mrs. Beal asks for the custody of the younger children.

Try to Steal Washers—Henry Miller, 1315 Davenport and Henry Evans, Ninth and Dodge streets, arrested Thursday afternoon by Officers Vanous and Wright for stealing covers off of manholes back of the city hall and court house, were arraigned before Judge Foster. Miller was fined \$10 and costs and Evans dismissed. The former tried to break away from the officers when arrested.

School Gives Two Performances—Two performances of "Bonnie Bell, Cousin of Cinderella," were given by fourth grade pupils of Monmouth Park school Friday afternoon, parents of pupils and students from other grades composing the audience. First performance was given at 1:15 o'clock, and the other followed at 2:30. Miss Elvira Linton, teacher of the fourth grade, directed the work.

Big Apartment House Sold—The Ivy apartment house, Sixteenth street and Sherman avenue, has been sold by the Hart-Beck company to Frank Habbitt of Florence. The purchase price was not given out, but real estate men say the figure must have been around \$50,000. The Ivy is a four-story brick apartment house. It occupies a large lot and has a wide frontage on Sixteenth street. Habbitt made the purchase as an investment.

Held on Insanity Charge—Joseph Brodie, who was arrested by Eddie Fleming Tuesday night for beating Miss Bonnie Diamond, 1923 North Eighteenth street, because she preferred his room to his company, was taken to the county jail on an insanity warrant. Brodie apparently got the habit of attempting to force his attentions on Miss Diamond, and had been reprimanded in police court several times with no effect. Upon examination he was found not responsible for his actions.

Hauling Beaver Boards—The east is now shipping building material to the west, and the Milwaukee is hauling 120 cars of beaver board from Chicago to Omaha and the cities on the Pacific coast. The beaver board is a composite product and takes the place of sheathing and lath and plaster. It comes in strips eight to twelve feet long and three to four feet wide. Each side of a thin strip of board is covered with a pulp preparation that is practically fireproof and turns water like metal. Laid end to end, these strips of beaver board resist the Milwaukee is handling wood to make a continuous walk from New York to Denver and back to Omaha.

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE CONSERVATIVE SAVINGS AND LOAN ASSOCIATION

In view of the various statements and criticisms made in one of the daily papers relative to some of the loan companies holding back in the readjustment of their loans with cyclone sufferers because the tornado insurance companies have not settled their claims with the building and loan associations, we believe that in justice to yourselves and members of this association (and for the information of the public as well), you should understand the exact situation so far as it relates to the Conservative Savings and Loan association.

Five years ago this association placed a blanket tornado insurance policy for the benefit of its investing and savings members, with the Insurance Company of North America. Almost immediately following the signing of this policy the Bellevue cyclone destroyed several houses on which this association held loans. The losses suffered by us at that time, under that policy, were promptly and satisfactorily adjusted and paid.

Upon the day following the Omaha tornado, the state agent for the Insurance Company of North America called at our offices and stated that he, together with the adjuster of said company for the state of Iowa, were on the ground for the purpose of adjusting not only our losses under the blanket policy, but to adjust the individual losses of our members and all other persons carrying specific insurance in said company on their respective properties. Mr. Henderson, state agent, advises us that all of his seventy-six specific losses have been adjusted and paid with one exception.

On April 4 the vice president of the insurance company from Philadelphia, and the western manager from Chicago, were in the city, and with the officers of this association reviewed carefully the entire stricken district, examining every loss where we might have a claim against them, practically fixing valuations at that time. We have therefore been in position for the last two weeks to arrange settlements with those borrowing members whose properties were destroyed. As a matter of fact, we have been settling individual cases for the last two weeks where the balance of funds needed had been arranged for by the borrower.

The chief difficulty has been and still is that some fifty of our borrowers, whose places were either totally destroyed or practically so, need relief, either by way of donation or second mortgage loans, or by both donation and loans. They cannot proceed further without this assistance. These borrowers have visited our offices and are satisfied, so far as we have been advised, with the valuations placed on their properties and a number are ready and have been ready for some days to proceed to rebuild, provided they can secure public assistance either by donation or second mortgage loans. The restoration committee, of which H. A. Tukey is chairman and W. O. Paisley secretary, and whose business it is to make second mortgage loans without interest, have been very prompt in aiding all those making application to them for second mortgages, where they were entitled to the assistance asked. A considerable number of our borrowers need a donation in addition to the second mortgage loan. To make it all second mortgage and no donation loads them up too heavily with debt. The difficulty just now is for them to secure action from the relief committee in determining the amount of donation to which they are entitled.

We realize that these committees are working with a delicate and complicated situation, and that full and complete information must be secured before definite conclusions can be reached. So far as the members of the different building and loan associations are concerned, we believe that the reports of the officers of these associations are practically as complete and reliable as can be obtained. We have been doing business with many of these people for years and know them and their conditions. It has been our effort to aid these public committees in every way possible by furnishing as full information as is in our possession wherever it has been asked. Promptness in granting this relief is the one great thing to be desired just now, even if the amount granted is not as large as the applicant thinks he should receive. With money in hand, reconstruction work can be begun at once on many of these former homes, or a new start can be made toward securing a new home in a new location. It is the purpose of our organization and has always been our effort to aid home-builders in getting into their own properties, and we have not for one moment held back at this time. On the contrary we have been lending every possible assistance to our individual borrowers, as well as to relief committees, in bringing about prompt assistance to those who have suffered so great losses. Furthermore, we believe that all of the building associations of the city have done their best at this time to aid in bringing about prompt settlements and re-establishing the homeless. So far as we can learn there are but one or two cases where matters have perhaps been unduly delayed and there may have been reasons for delay in those cases. It is not best to condemn or criticize in times like these until the full facts are known. Sincerely yours,

INSURANCE MONEY FOR REPAIRS FORTHCOMING

The Nebraska Savings and Loan association has closed up its tornado insurance accounts with borrowers whose homes were damaged or destroyed by the tornado. The total amount received was \$31,000.

In all cases where homes were damaged the insurance money was turned over to home owners for immediate use, while those rebuilding will be given necessary funds as the work proceeds. The Nebraska association was particularly fortunate in requiring individual tornado insurance in preference to the blanket policy, consequently the losses of borrowers were more quickly adjusted.
