

LINCOLN, April 19 .- (Special.)-Track athletics at the University of Nebraska will be formally ushered in next Saturday, when the Cornhuskers and the Ames Aggles will meet in Lincoln on the cinder path. Assistant Coach Reed, who has charge of the Husker track squad, had practically picked is squad and is greatly encouraged at the strides which the newcomers on the team have made in the last week.

The Cornhuskers are stronger now than anytime in the last three years, it is believed, and Reed had a quartet of exceptional runners in Reese, Racely, Zumwinkle and Wherry. The Cornhusker mentor is not worrying about their ability to take care of themselves against any four in the Missouri Valley.

WOMAN TO HOLD RACE MEET

Racing Commission Grants Mrs. Le Bus License for Contests.

RUN ON HER HINATA TRACK

The Meeting Will Be Invitation, but Will Be Surrounded by All Marks of Sheepshead Bay.

LEXINGTON, Ky., April 19 .- For the first time in the history of racing a license has been issued to a woman to conduct a day of sport. The Kentucky Racing commission has granted the sanction and Mrs. Clarence Le Bus is to hold the meeting at her Hinata farm, near Lexington. This meeting will be by invitation, but will be surrounded by all the professional earmarks of a Suburban day at Sheepshead Bay-except, naturally, in the number of people present and horses that will compete. Thursday, April 24, is the day selected by Mrs. Le Bus, and she proposes that it shall be quite the most remarkable social and sporting event that has ever been held at any of the many famous Blue Grass farms.

Hinata is the Japanese for sunshine, and the farm is laid out with the Japanese idea dominating all its buildings. The clubhouse smacks of the far east, and there are countless little shelters patterned after the tea houses of that country, while the idea is carried out more fully in the landscape gardens of the
