It is to be noted also that his grandson, Junius Spencer Morgan, Jr., a young man of only 21, a student at Harvard, is repeatedly nominated to take up important duties in the event of the death of his father, John Pierpont Morgan, Jr.

As to His Art Treasures.
I have been greatly interested for many years in gathering my collections of paintings, miniatures, porcelains and other works of art, and it has been my desire and intention to make some suitable disposition of them or of such portions of them as I might determine, which would render them permanently available for the instruction and pleasure of the American people.

To Christian Institutions.
The will bequeathes to the trustees of the estate and property of the diocesan convention of New York the following two sums, \$50,000 in trust to apply to the income for the support of the ministry of St. George's church and the sum of \$100,000 in trust, the income of which is to be applied for the support of Protestant Episcopal missionary stations.

Even His Club Friends.
Mr. Morgan's sentiment for a few of his old and intimate friends is shown in the clause which shows "that there shall be bequeathed to each of the members of the Corsair club at the time of his death, as a souvenir of myself and as a token of my personal affection for them, a piece of silver of the value of \$1,000, to be selected and purchased for the purpose by the executors of my will."

Specific Bequests in Morgan Will

Frances Louisa Tracy Morgan, wife of Junius Spencer Morgan, Jr., in addition sufficient from the Junius Spencer Morgan trust to provide her with an annual income of \$100,000; also the homes at Cragston and New York City, with their contents and all their appurtenances for life.

Corbin insisted that seventy-five members of the house were opposed to removal and seventeen senators favored removal, and he objected to seventeen senators having seventy-five representatives.

As to Referendum.
Both branches of the legislature adopted a motion to have the people vote on the question under the initiative and referendum at the next general election. This action was taken after the senate had refused to adopt the conference committee report and the house had adopted it.

What was considered a joker sufficient to practically prevent any development of the water power of the state was discovered in senate file No. 14 and corrected at the last moment today. Senate file No. 14 is an irrigation bill and reached the governor several days ago. Governor Signs Bills

LINCOLN, April 20.—(Special.)—The following bills were signed by the governor yesterday:
H. R. 442, by Anderson—Puts charges for probating on a flat basis ranging from \$10 to \$50.
H. R. 565, by Nichols and Reagan—Appropriates \$50,000 for construction of hospital at Norfolk asylum.

S. F. 23, by Ollis—Provides for incorporation of employers' mutual insurance liability associations.
S. F. 112, by Reynolds—Removes restrictions from towns less than 1,500 affecting rights to issue school bonds.
