CUBS AND CINCINNATI TIE

Game Called at End of Ninth, Five to Five.

HOME RUN IN LAST INNING

Chicago Appears to Have Game Won in Fifth, When Five Runs Are Scored on Six Hits.

CINCINNATI, O., April 23.—Chicago and Cincinnati played to a tie today, the game being called at the end of the ninth inning with the score, 5 to 5. It had been agreed that the game should be called at 5 o'clock, to allow Cincinnati to catch a train, but play continued a few minutes after that hour to permit the last half of the ninth to be finished.

Cincinnati tied the score in the ninth inning, when Bates knocked out a home run, bringing in a runner ahead of him.

Chicago appeared to have the game won in the fifth inning, when five runs were scored on six hits. Cincinnati, however, scored one each in the seventh and eighth and two in the ninth. Each team used three pitchers. Score:

National Agreement is Bar to Monopoly

NEW YORK, April 23.—If a congressional investigation committee is appointed to look into organized base ball, declares W. H. Laclede, the new president of the Philadelphia National league, "the interesting fact will be made public that 50 per cent of the major league clubs and 75 per cent of the minor leagues lost money last season. This was due to the high salaries paid to the players and the heavy traveling expenses, coupled with the big money spent in rebuilding ball parks."
