Renewal of discussion concerning large needs for wheat in Europe and estimates that a great part of it, with the European situation as it is, must come from America, was accompanied with specific statements that more than 1,500,000 bush-els had been worked in the last few days for export from New York. Fears that some harm to growing wheat had come from frosts last night, in Nebraska, Kansas and western lowa and Missouri, added to the bullish sentiment, as did the unsettled European politician situa-tion brought about by the Scutari inel-dent. The market showed strength nearly all day, temporary depressions on profit taking being followed by good rallies. July showed a bit of weakness just at the close, but May heid steady. The Argen-tine situation was a factor in the day's influence. A cut of 3,000,000 bushels in the Argentine visible was noted. Primary receipts of wheat today were 535,000 bushels against 28,00 bushels last year. Seaboard clearances of wheat and flour equal 674,000 bushels. Declines at Kansas City and Ornaha depressed corn here. Expectation of larger offerings also had a weakening tendency. Oats eased off on a large in crease in receipts. Selling pressure wiped out the small
