Attorney General Asks that Co gold ations that Made Agreement to Withdraw from the State Be Pined.

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., April 26.-Attorney General Barker filed in the supreme court today quo warranto proceedngs against a number of fire insurance ompanies on a charge of violating the anti-trust law in combining to withdraw from the state. The attorney general asked that the companies be fined. The processings were directed against 109 empanies belonging to the Western In-

surance union. The information charges that the companies have entered into an unlawful ombination to refuse to write insurance in Missouri, thus leaving the people of the state without adequate insurance protection; and to cancel politics heretofore written, which would causea financial calamity.
