ERRORS FOUND IN BILLS ARE BEING CORRECTED

LINCOLN, April 26.—(Special.)—Senator File 307, the bill creating a revenue and taxation commission, which was mixed up in a legislative muddle with another bill covering the same subject, but which was signed by the governor in place of the one which passed both houses, has been fixed up and the governor has affixed his signature.

House Bill 85, a bill appropriating \$2,000 to Mrs. Nichols as a relief for the loss of her son while in the service of the state, reached the governor showing only an appropriation of \$1,500. This was also shown to be a mistake of the engraving clerk and the amount has been substituted as it passed both houses and Mrs. Nichols will receive the full amount.

The auditor's office is now drawing warrants for the payment of the newspapers which published the constitutional amendments last fall and will be in the hands of the newspapermen in a few days.

TEKAMAH WINS SUFFRAGE DEBATE FROM CRAIG

TEKAMAH, Neb., April 26.—(Special.)—Tekamah high school defeated Craig High school Friday evening in a debate at the high school auditorium on the question of votes for women. Tekamah had the affirmative side of the question, being represented by Robert Nebbit, Gerald Smith and Harold Freeman. The Craig school was represented by Geraldine Flanagan, Harry Corbin and Bessie Gordon. Each debater was allowed ten minutes and the leaders five minutes for rebuttal. The judges were Superintendent Gibson of Lyons, Rev. Mr. Henderson of Craig and J. A. Singhaus of Tekamah.

The difference in points given was slight and both schools showed excellent preparation on the part of their representatives. The high school band furnished music for the occasion.

OMAHA STREET RAILWAY APPEALS DAMAGE CASE

LINCOLN, Neb., April 26.—(Special.)—The Omaha & Council Bluffs Street Railway company filed in the office of the clerk of the supreme court this morning an appeal from the Douglas county district court in a case where Fortunato Zancanelli had obtained damages for injuries received by reason of being struck by a car of the defendant company.

The plaintiff set out in the trial that he was riding in a delivery wagon with Anton Albert when at the intersection of Tenth and Jackson streets, Omaha, the wagon was struck by a car going at a high rate of speed and he was thrown out and seriously injured. He set his damages at \$5,000, but the jury decided that \$2,000 was about the right amount and the company disagrees and files an appeal.

OXFORD HIGH SCHOOL TEAM DEFEATS MCCOOK DEBATERS

OXFORD, Neb., April 26.—(Special Telegram.)—Oxford High school won over McCook High school in debate tonight. This is the final debate in this section and Oxford thus becomes the champion of the southwestern Nebraska debating league. Oxford was represented by Merlin Springer, Fred Helmer and Edward Pettygrove, while McCook was represented by Minnie Verson, Ida Gordon and Albert Barnes.

Train Backs Into Wagon.

YORK, Neb., April 26.—(Special.)—About 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon Mr. and Mrs. I. N. Darnell and their daughter, Anna, were crossing the Burlington tracks, when a train backed into the wagon, smashing it into kindling and breaking one of the horses' legs. Just how the occupants escaped injury no one is able to tell.

Effort at Suicide Fails.

COLUMBUS, Neb., April 26.—(Special Telegram.)—A. D. White, formerly of St. Edward, attempted to commit suicide this morning in a toilet room at the Union Pacific depot by severing his jugular vein. He did not succeed, as the knife he used was a small affair and he was locked up in the county jail. He had been in the city for several days.

He was picked up and whirled through space at the rate of 100 revolutions a minute. His left arm was badly wrenched from the socket and his feet badly bruised.

Saloon Men Are Sued.

KEARNEY, Neb., April 26.—(Special.)—Francis Moran has filed suit in district court against Mose Kithcarty and Martin Slattery, two saloon keepers of Shelton, in which he holds them indirectly responsible for the death of her husband, which occurred on Wednesday, April 16, and asks for damages to the extent of \$10,000. Moran met his death in a runaway accident. The case comes up for trial at the May term of the district court in this city.

Fairbury Woman Dies of Burns.

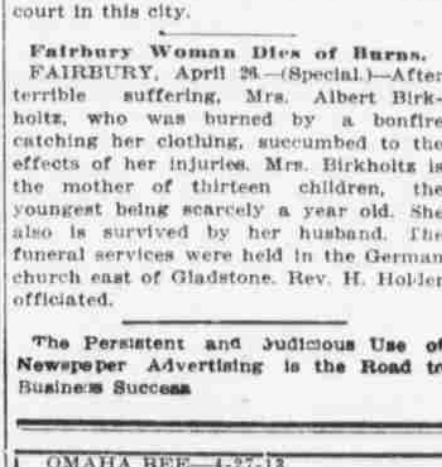

CHANGES AT WHITE HOUSE

How the Wilson Family Has Rearranged the Order of Living.

Persons familiar with the interior of the White house during the last administration would find themselves in unfamiliar quarters did they enter the presidential home today. In the six weeks of her residence Mrs. Wilson has made a complete transformation in the appearance of the lower suite.

Mrs. Taft used the blue, red and green rooms as family living room. The president and Mrs. Wilson and their family have forsaken the lower floor and taken themselves to the apartments above stairs. The red, blue and green rooms have been restored to their earlier estate and will be used only for formal or semi-formal occasions.

The much-discussed "studio in the White House" has not materialized, nor is it likely to. However, the numerous canvases and photographs that beautified the modest home at No. 25 Cleveland lane, Princeton, have found a place in the family quarters. Mrs. Wilson has her tea table set in the red room for the more formal 5 o'clock tea, and the china service of the White House is used.

This service was bought at the time of the renovation of the White House in Mr. Roosevelt administration, and is known as the "Roosevelt china."

Nowadays it is at an early hour that the president and his household gather for the morning meal in the breakfast room. The luncheons and dinners in the state dining room also are served at a much earlier hour than for past presidents, and punctuality to the fraction of a minute is the watchword of the new family.—Newark Herald.

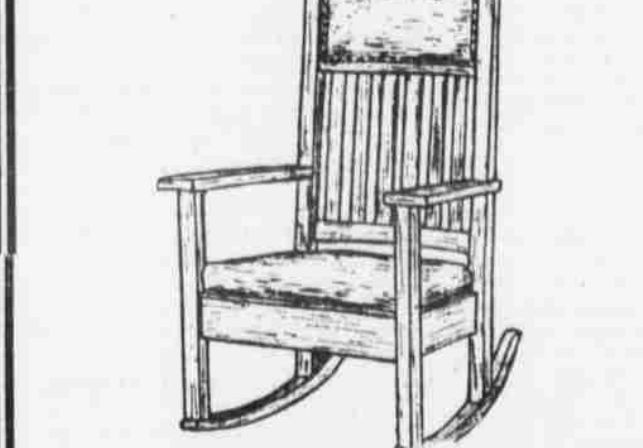

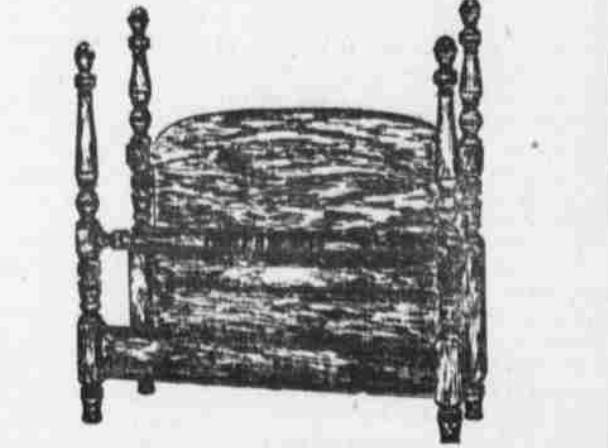
