South Omaha Double Shift for Firemen Adds Eleven Men

The law passed recently by the state legislature providing for two platoons on the South Omaha fire department will go into effect July 1, and eleven new firemen will be appointed by the fire and police board. If the funds are low the new firemen will not begin work until after August 1, when the new levy will be made by the city council.

Under the present arrangement there are five men in each company. Every five days one of the men in each company is off, leaving but four men on duty. The double shift will give each company six men, three working days and three on duty nights. There will be two shifts of seven men each at No. 1 fire house, where the chief is and where all the large fire apparatus is housed.

There will be forty men on the city payroll under the new system. While this is not a great increase over the number employed at present it bids fair to greatly facilitate the fire protection of South Omaha.

Fire Chief John McKale is heartily in favor of the double shift. While it makes no change in his work, he having to be on duty all the time, he says it will make it much easier for the firemen and they will be able to do better work.

Thirty-Five Are Helped to Rebuild Destroyed Homes

Second loans in the number of thirty-five have been made to date by the restoration committee, according to Chairman Sam Burns, Jr. The aggregate amount of these loans is \$2,900 in round numbers, or an average of some \$80 per case. Through rehabilitation work done by the relief committee 154 cases have been covered. The average appropriation in these cases is \$10, making a total actually appropriated of \$4,675 for the repair and rebuilding of homes partially wrecked or destroyed in the tornado. The relief committee has at present under consideration 173 other cases for rehabilitation. The cases that have actually been turned down are comparatively very few. The total number of cases turned down, which includes those that were considered rather cases for the restoration committee to handle, numbers fifteen.

The relief committee hopes within ten days or so to complete a list of those who are likely to need the assistance of the committee in re-establishing their households. The committee feels that this is information that should be recorded in complete form in order that it will know better how to proceed with the funds at hand.

Firemen Save Life of Mrs. Wm. Riley

Timely arrival of firemen from engine house No. 3 in response to an alarm at 3 o'clock yesterday from 1715 Jackson street saved Mrs. William Riley from death by suffocation. She was dragged from bed in a room filled with smoke, just in the nick of time.

The Rileys live in the basement of the house. T. B. Robertson occupies the

ground floor. He was awakened by the cracking of timbers and turned in the alarm. He had time to dress and arouse his family before making his escape, and it was not until firemen entered to fight the flames that the absence of Mrs. Riley was noticed. The origin of the fire has not been determined.

FINED \$25 AND COSTS FOR BEING INSULTING

"Mike" O'Donnell, laborer, of Cleveland, O., arrested on North Twenty-fourth street, near Lake street, was fined \$25 and costs in police court for being drunk and insulting women and children on the street. O'Donnell was taken in custody by Officers Buchard and Troy on complaint of several pedestrians, who stated he was bumping into women and children and would then turn and curse them.

STRIKES OFFICER, GETS FINED \$10 AND COSTS

J. P. Walsh, charged with being drunk and resisting an officer, was fined \$10 and costs in police court. Walsh, who failed to give his name at the station, was booked as John Doe. Upon leaving the patrol wagon he struck Officer Reigelman in the face. In court he stated he had no recollection of the affair.

GENERAL FREDERICK SMITH WILL BE RETIRED SOON

On May 15 Brigadier General Frederick A. Smith will retire from active service with the United States army. It is in this manner that he will celebrate his sixty-fourth birthday. Word has been received that the general has been relieved from further duty at Texas, where he has been in charge of the Fifth brigade. He will leave Texas immediately and arrive in Omaha next Tuesday.

He Returns Money for Forged Checks With Tainted Coin

Mogy Bernstein, probation officer, is the recipient of money derived from forged checks. How this dreadful result came about is a story of the inveterate kindness of Judge Kennedy of the juvenile court and his insatiable desire to save sinners.

Mogy put up \$30 to get a repentant youth from going to jail on a charge of forging checks on Hayden Brothers and the McCaffrey saloon. He got the money back all right—but it was tainted. The young man just went and forged some more checks for double the amount—and gave Mogy half.

Now Martin Nielson, aged 15 years, is held by the police. One of the last checks he is accused of writing was for the Brandeis stores. He was captured by Mogy Bernstein Friday night. The boy wanted a few minutes to take his girl home, but Mogy said no. He gave his residence as 408 South Twenty-fifth ave.

Nielson came voluntarily to Judge Kennedy several days ago and asked for another chance. Judge Kennedy and Officer Bernstein asserted that such cases do not discourage them, but that they will trust the next repentant wrongdoer just as willingly.
