

DAVIS BECOMES CHIEF CLERK

Former Nebraskan Takes Important Place Under Secretary Bryan. FORMERLY WAS HIS SECRETARY

Lived for Time in Omaha and Went to Washington, Where He Has Made Rapid Rise Under Civil Service.

WASHINGTON, April 26.—(Special Telegram)—Although on the surface there appears to be little pie for the demagogue because of the slowness of the president in making appointments, there is considerable movement in the underground sections of the departments where the chief, that is, the secretary, is all powerful and does not have to ask the boss.

Secretary Bryan, not to be outdone by his fellow cabinetiers, has made several important changes in the personnel of his office, and among those changes scheduled for May 1 is that of Ben G. Davis, who will become chief clerk of the State department on that date.

Mr. Davis went into departmental life when Mr. Bryan left congress and he has since until Mr. Bryan became secretary of state, when Davis was made confidential secretary and now becomes chief clerk, which is going some.

Mr. Davis was born in Illinois and educated in the public schools of Mount Morris, Lincoln and Carthage colleges, Illinois. After his college work he removed to Omaha, where he engaged in business until he came west with Secretary Bryan.

Mr. Davis comes to his present position through the civil service.

AFFAIRS AT SOUTH OMAHA

Loyalty to Gillin Being Made Test of True Democracy.

SENATOR HITCHCOCK IN FIGHT

Sends Personal Representative to Line Up Voters and Many of Them Object to the Process.

Fidelity to the principles of the democratic party in South Omaha are measured by loyalty to John Gillin, according to the present plan of campaign. Hitchcock's name is being mentioned in a casual way as being the enemy of the "Gillin," but the real test is whether or no the democrat is going to vote for Gillin.

This developed yesterday, when a representative of Senator Hitchcock's paper, who has been employed at Lincoln during the legislative session, appeared in the city and began putting democrats through the third degree.

One democrat, who has held office under democratic auspices, who has given his time and his money to the furtherance of the party's fortunes, presented the indignities of the process.

WOMAN TRIED AS A TRAITOR

Court-Martial Summoned to Hear Charges Against Suffragette. HAD BOASTED OF VIOLENCE

"General" Flora Drummond and Cabinet of Social and Political Union Act as Judges in the Case.

LONDON, April 25.—A rift between the Woman's Social and Political union, the organization of militant suffragettes, and its American members was indicated today by the summoning of a "court martial" composed of "General" Mrs. Flora Drummond, acting as judge advocate, and the "cabinet" of the union sitting as judges to try Mrs. Mary Ford of New York on a charge of alleged treason to the society.

The military features of the court were all in correct form with the exception that there was no means of compelling the attendance of the accused, who failed to appear.

Mrs. Ford later said that she knew nothing of the charge and did not expect to appear before the court.

Failed to Give Information. The charges against Mrs. Ford, as prepared by "General" Drummond, were three, as follows:

"I failing to inform the union as to the exact hour of the release of Miss Zelle Emerson of Jackson, Mich., which fact was within Mrs. Ford's knowledge and being valuable to the organization she was in duty bound to reveal."

The allegation that Mrs. Ford had told American press representatives in London that the union planned the kidnapping of Miss Emerson from her mother.

"That Mrs. Ford had contravened a strict rule of the union by announcing publicly that she had committed specified acts of militancy."

In the court it was explained that this rule was very important and the fact was pointed out showing that the only suffragettes who were caught were captured red-handed, while the others went scot free.

Denounced as "Traitor." In reciting these facts, which she claimed were proved by a sheet of clippings from American papers, which she waved aloft, "General" Drummond denounced the American woman as a traitor.

When informed of the charges, Mrs. Ford declared she knew nothing of them and believed herself to be on the most friendly terms with the organization, which she had been assisting by voluntary work in its press bureau.

Mrs. Ford ridiculed the second charge, stating that she had not informed anyone of such a plot which she herself was unaware existed.

Today's affair is considered as important, all the "cabinet" of the Woman's Social and Political union out of all being present.

General Drummond declares that the militant organization is full of spies, no less than six of its members, one of which is an American woman, being agents of Scotland Yard.
