There was a fairly good action in wheat yesterday. The buying by the Chicago trade became a little too unanimous around top prices and there was enough profit taking and closing out of early purchases the last hour to give the reactions in the early months. Added to this yesterday the trade had the disturbing political features in Europe, and early report of Austrian troops crossing the frontier to oppose Montenegro. About the same time the southwest sent a number of somewhat alarming reports of excessive appearance of insects. There was some export business at Kansas City. The milling deance of insects. There was some export business at Kansas City. The milling demand for wheat in Chicago was good with sales of 14.00 bushels. Because Canada did not report wheat afloat on the lakes there was a decrease of over 16,00,000 bushels in the world's visible supply of stocks given out by Bradstreets. At Minneapolis there was a decrease of 320,000 bushels in stocks for three days. The cables told of a strike at Posario, which may interfere with Argentina's wheat shipments. The visible wheat stocks in Europe were cut nearly 4,000,000 bushels in the last week. Traders feel that the foreign situation and the possibility of a lowering of the crop promise in this country are on the side of conservative buyers who get into the market on frequent depressions. The wheat market of late is a queer proposition to traders. Notwithstanding the excellent crop promise, the fine soil conditions and the bumper crop of last season prices continue to go up.

CHICAGO. April 30.—Covering by May shorts today gave strength to wheat after a weak opening. A net upturn of a shade to %04% was made. Corn made a net gain of %c and oats finished 4%c to 124%gibc higher.

Considerable activity was displayed by shorts in wheat, who were covering before tomorrow. An effirst day of the pay settlement period. The ensuing upturn in values was alded by milling sales of rather large proportions.
