

TO CLEAN OUTSIDE DAIRIES

Health Commissioner Asks State to Assist in the Work.

TO SEND AN INSPECTOR HERE

State Food Commissioner Will Help in the Work of Bettering the Outside Milk Supply for the City.

Health Commissioner Connell has prevailed upon C. E. Harman, state pure food commissioner, to send an inspector here to inspect milk sold in the Omaha creameries by dairies outside of the city limits.

"There are about thirty-three dairies furnishing milk to the creameries," said Dr. Connell. "The creameries pasteurize the milk or else it simply couldn't be used. Still, pasteurization doesn't make it very good milk. You can't make good milk out of poor milk."

"Some of the milk sold to these creameries—the Waterloo and the Alamo—contains from 2,000,000 to 5,000,000 bacteria per cubic centimeter. Pasteurization destroys these bacteria, but if the milk was not pasteurified it couldn't be used."

Dr. Connell says the city dairy inspector, owing to lack of help, cannot inspect these outside dairies. He will again recommend the city commission to furnish the inspector with an automobile instead of another assistant, both of which are needed. Dairy Inspector Bosse visits the dairies in a buggy and can, therefore, only make a few of them. The dairies Connell has asked the state pure food department to inspect are, in some cases, twenty-eight miles out of the city.

Dr. Connell has taken up with the state pure food department the advisability of stationing a state inspector in this vicinity all the time. Harman indicates that such may be done ultimately, but he is now unable to comply with the request.

Probation Officer Vindicates Action With a Statement

Mosy Bernstein, probation officer, denies that his action in preventing Dale Roberts, aged 6 years, from selling papers on the streets was due to the fact that the child was engaged in a contest for a prize, or that he was discriminating in the enforcement of the law prohibiting any child under 10 years from selling papers. He said:

"Last January Dale Roberts was almost run over by an automobile while selling papers. He was sent home at that time. On January 9 he was picked up for selling papers and taken home by one of our officers. At that time Miss Johnson of our office had a talk with Mrs. Roberts and explained the law, and she promised to keep the boy off the streets, but he has been seen on the streets since that time. My attention has been called to this boy selling papers a number of times by Mr. Lucian Stevens.

"Last Thursday morning I found Vera Roberts, aged 8, selling papers during school hours. I took her papers and brought them to the office, and I told Vera to tell her mother to come and see me at the office. The same afternoon Mrs. Roberts sent her 10-year-old child, Gretta, and Vera out to sell papers again. I took them to the office and sent Miss Josephine Rhodes, one of our officers, home with the children. When it was explained to me that these were the children who had been sent home a number of times since last January I ordered a complaint filed against the two children. In the hearing last Saturday Judge Kennedy found that the children were neglected.

"I did not know of any boy being in the contest, nor did I know that there was a contest."

Harte Scores City for Condition of the Main Thoroughfares

Criticism of the condition of roads leading into Omaha within the city limits was made by A. C. Harte, chairman of the roads committee of the Board of County Commissioners. Mr. Harte asserted that he had urged City Commissioner Hummel, who has charge of the city's roads, to improve the highways, but without result.

"We receive complaints," said Mr. Harte, "that the Center street, the Military, the East Omaha and the West Dodge roads are in bad condition. They are. Visitors travel over good roads in the county until they come to the city limits. They do not know when they pass the Omaha boundary and their complaints are made to county officials. We can do nothing."

German Widow May Be Deported; Can't Do Hard Work

Because she refused to work in the field in the United States as a peasant woman do in Europe, Mrs. Anna Kauffman, a widow, who has two small sons dependent on her, probably will be deported. She came to Omaha from Germany last September.

Nebraskans Quoted on the Canal Rates

The opponents of "Coastwise Exemption" in canal tolls are circulating a bulky pamphlet of "representative opinions" in support of their contention, and among others quote these two from Nebraska: S. Avery, Chancellor The University of Nebraska—"I have always regarded the provision of the Panama canal bill exempting the coastwise trade of the United States as a very grave mistake on the part of congress. As an American citizen with quite a large acquaintance among prominent men in Europe, I feel humiliated whenever the subject is mentioned."

The legislative session over, the city commission keeping out of print, no salaries being raised by public officials, the Associated Press and other organizations of business and politics working smoothly, the Omaha Real Estate exchange held only a short meeting yesterday. NO PETITION IS CIRCULATED

No Effort Here to Beat Appropriation for Nebraska City Armory.

MILITIAMEN AGAINST THE MOVE

Colonel A. D. Fetterman Says It Would Be a Bad Precedent to Invoke Referendum First Time in Such a Cause.

So far as is known by officers of the state militia troops in Omaha none of the petitions have as yet been circulated in Omaha to invoke the referendum for the defeat of the \$20,000 appropriation for a state armory at Nebraska City. Militiamen in Omaha have been watching with interest the reports from Lincoln to the effect that such petitions are being circulated by an organization calling itself the "Vetera's Legislative League."

Militiamen here feel that the movement to defeat this appropriation is an unworthy one and feel that the invoking of the referendum would be a dangerous thing.

Concerning the movement, Colonel A. D. Fetterman of Omaha, inspector general of the Nebraska national guard, has the following to say:

"As a practical proposition, the attempt of the Vetera's Legislative League of Lincoln to thwart the will of the legislature in making a \$20,000 appropriation for a state armory at Nebraska City by forcing the measure to a referendum vote, suspending its operation in the meantime, is fraught with a far reaching danger to the state. Overlooking the fact that the action of the league is so unpatriotic in singling out the citizen-soldiers of the state for attack that I cannot conceive that the plan is the well considered action of broad minded citizens, there is immediately developed the necessity of every county which possesses a state institution rallying to the defense of the Nebraska City bill to save its own interests in future.

Establish Bad Principle.

"If this armory appropriation is defeated by the referendum, then the principle is established that the enemies of any state institution may circulate referendum petitions, easily pick up signatures of disgruntled or parsimonious taxpayers equal to 10 per cent of the whole number and stop any improvement for which the legislature has made an appropriation, no matter how much needed, until the whole matter is threshed out at a referendum election. The most trivial

appropriation must then be fought for twice by an institution and its friends—first before the legislature, and then again before the people.

"It would be but natural that the thousands of young men of the state now members of the Nebraska National Guard, or who have been members in recent years, and who served it in the Spanish war, should resent the covert attack being made upon the whole institution. The only reason so far assigned by the league at Lincoln is that if an armory is built at Nebraska City, a precedent will be established whereby every other city with a national guard organization will also want an armory, and that as a matter of principle, it should be defeated.

"The fact that the state of Nebraska does not own a single armory, but leaves its citizen soldiers to seek rented quarters wherever they may, is a disgrace to the state, and a movement to gradually build armories in keeping with the pride of the state, say at the rate of one a year, saving rent each time one is built, is an investment easily borne, and should be looked upon with favor by every patriotic citizen of the state."

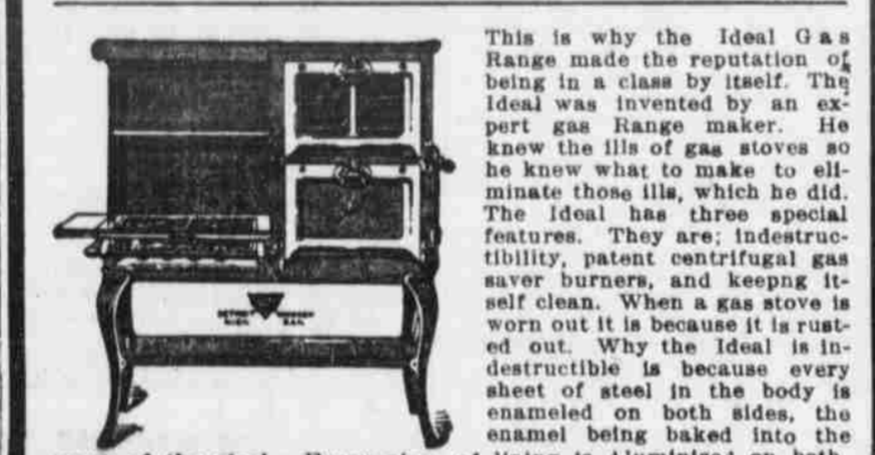

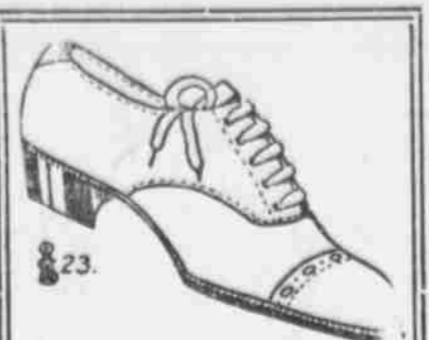
