FOLLOWS A LONG DEPRESSION

Lenders Rise Two and Three Points and Canadian Pacific Scores an Advance of Six Points.

NEW YORK, May 1 -An outburst such NEW YORK, May 1—An outburst such as had not been witnessed for severa, weeks radically altered the appearance of the stock market today, after a long period of hesitation and declining prices. Such market leaders as Reading, Union Pacific and Steel and Amalgamated rose to 3 points. Canadian Pacific scored a 6-point advance.

The market was broad and vigorous on the upturn and, while the demand was keenest for the speculative favorites, all classes of stocks benefited by the movement. The reason commonly ascribed for the change was the decidedly hopeful tone of cable advices following the conference of ambassadors in London, Montenegro's reply to the powers was believed to have done much to clear the atmosphere. The principal European markets being closed on account of a holiday, traders were deprived of the usual barometer of conditions abroad, but the vigor with which the list responded to the London Sables showed that there was no hesitation here in placing a bullish interpretation upon them.

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It was probably true, however, that the technical condition of the market was largely responsible for the selling movement. Selling had sone on so long that the short was apparently inflated to an abnormal degree. The strength of the market at times yesterday and their resillency before the receipt of the market would bound up on any favorable development of sufficient importance to give built traders an opening. When the turn in the market came bear traders were compelled to give hastly, bidding against each other for stocks and running up prices on themselves.

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The upward tendency of the leaders was held in check during the early part of the day by renewed liquidation of the recent weak features.

Over thirty new records for the year were made during the forence. In the list were New Haven, which dropped 34, to 1624; Baltimore & Ohio, New York Central and Illinois Central. While this movement was in progress the market was unsettled, some stocks moving back and forth with violence.
