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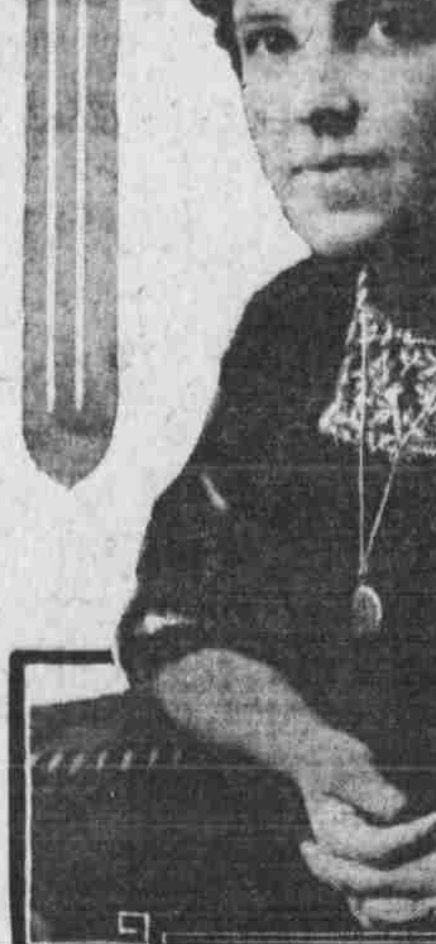
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Seymour Lake Club House is Rebuilt Since the Tornado

Omahans Attend Big Conference on City Planning

The Omaha Civic league and the city commissioners are much interested in the national conference on city planning to be held at Chicago Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. At this meeting will be mayors from twenty-five cities and other city officials from many cities. Engineers who make a study of city planning and have done wonderful work in other cities along this line will convene from all over the United States.

Dana W. Bartlett, chairman of the city planning commission of Los Angeles, will be there, heading a delegation from that city and Virgil G. Bogue, author of the "Seattle City Plan," who was in the early days in the engineering department of the Union Pacific railway at Omaha, will head the delegation from the northwest coast cities, where a great deal of work in city planning has been done. Mr. Bogue is one of the speakers on the program at the convention. Practically all of the eastern cities will have a representation and the indications are that this will be the most enthusiastic city planning convention that has been held in this country.

The Omaha Civic league has arranged for a membership in this national convention so as to get the benefit of the best information and the very latest work in city planning. From Omaha there will be a large delegation for such a convention, probably ten in all. The tornado relief work will prevent Mayor Dahlman from going and will probably prevent some of the other commissioners from attending. Commissioner Ryder and City Engineer Watson Townsend will go and probably Commissioners Withnell, Kugel and Hummel, with some probability of Dan Butler.

Other delegates from the Civic league going are T. R. Kimball, vice president; Roy N. Towle, delegate to the Civic league from the Forest association; E. M. Rohrbough, delegate to the Civic league from the Technical club, and George T. Morton, delegate from the Real Estate exchange and president of the Omaha Civic league. There may be some additions to this list. Several others have expressed a desire to be there if possible. This is to be the first national city planning convention that has been held so far west as Chicago and makes the opportunity for a study of the city planning question for Omaha an unusually good one. Reports will be made at the convention as to the progress of city planning work from probably twenty-five or thirty different cities that are now actively carrying out comprehensive city plans.

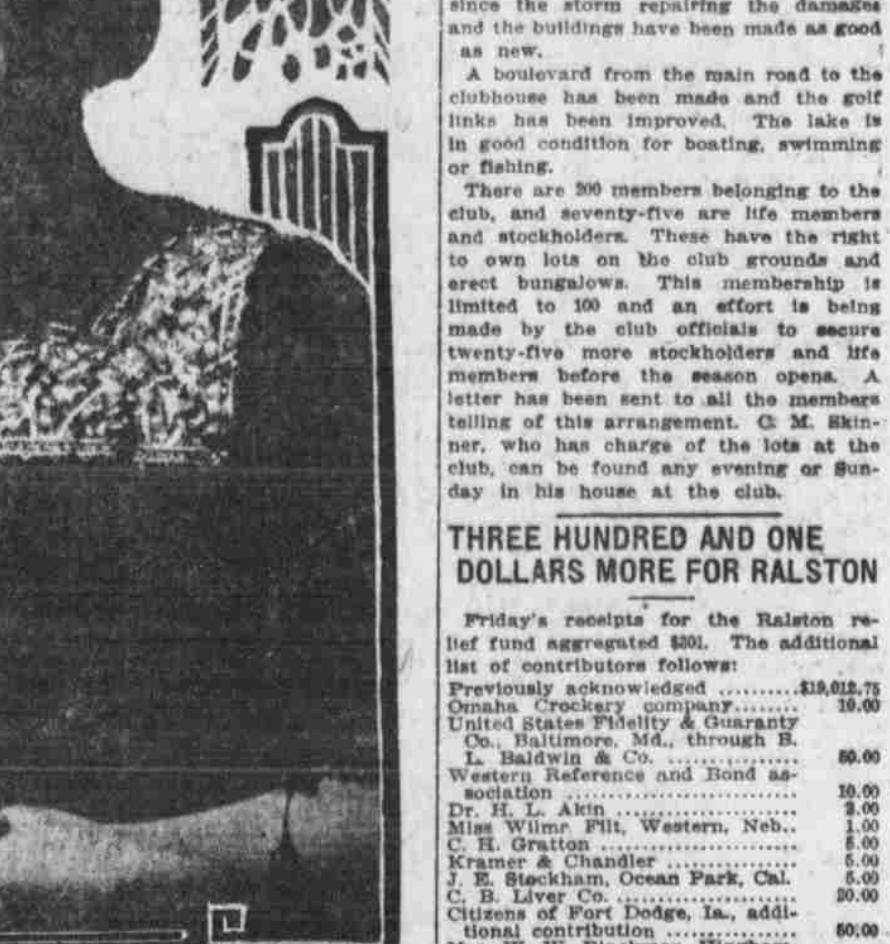
