Incre are many odd lighthouses throughout the world, but so far as is known the only inland "lighthouse," if so it may be called, is that situated far out in the Arizona desert.

This "lighthouse," as it is called, marks the spot where a well supplies fresh water to travelers. This is said to be the only spot where water may be had for forty-five miles to the east and for at least thirty miles to the west.

The "lighthouse" consists merely of a tall cottonwood pole, to the top of which there is holsted every night a lantern, the light of which may be seen for miles across the desert in every direction. The water, sweet and cold, is raised in a large bucket made from a barrel. The revolving drum above is propelled by a mule that knows just how many rounds it must make before the bucket rises to the point where it tips itself into a trough.—Harper's Weekly.
