ADJUTANT GENERAL TO MOVE
Quartered in Administration Building on Fair Grounds
ROOM FOR BOARD OF CONTROL
Board of Public Lands and Buildings Decides to Construct an Armory Soon at Fair Grounds.

LINCOLN, May 5.—(Special.)—Judge Howard Kennedy of Omaha, one of the members of the new Board of Control of the state institutions called at the state house today to consult with other members of the board, the governor and state officers in general regarding a location for the board when they organize.

After looking over the state house thoroughly, the State Board of Public Lands and Buildings decided to move the adjutant general's office to the administration building at the state fair grounds and use the offices vacated for the Board of Control. Work will be begun as soon as possible for the erection of an armory on the state fair grounds in which the adjutant general will move with all supplies now stored in the basement at the state house.

The Wayne depot case has at last been settled by an agreement of the Minneapolis & Omaha Railway company to construct a new brick station to cost in the neighborhood of \$2,500. The citizens of Wayne some time ago appeared before the railway commission asking for the new depot. The commission ordered the company to build the depot, but the railway refused to do so and appealed the matter to the supreme court. The case was to have been argued this week, but the company agreed to build the depot and the case probably will not be heard.

State Board Fixes
Pullman Values

LINCOLN, May 5.—(Special.)—The first meeting of the State Board of Equalization and Assessment was held today and the assessment of the Pullman Car company was taken up. The assessed valuation of the company in 1912 was \$123,885. This year it is \$129,087, being one-fifth of actual value.

The company reported that it had 275 standard sleeping cars running over 2,715 miles of road in Nebraska, with a valuation of \$11,645 per car.

HIGH SOCIETY IS UNCLEAN

Says Bishop Scannell in Sunday Sermon at St. Cecilia's Church.

NEED MORE MORAL EXAMPLES

Individuals with Good Habits Can Do More Than All the Legislation that May Be Instituted.

Conditions, existing in the high society of today, were compared with the surroundings of swine by Bishop Richard Scannell in a sermon before the congregation of St. Cecilia's church yesterday morning.

High society has sunk, he stated, to the lowest degree of degradation and is becoming more degenerate each day.

"Human high society is demoralized," said the bishop, "and this condition is not local, but worldwide."

"There is talk of remedying immoral conditions by legislation, but human efforts along this line will materialize in naught. The Holy Ghost, the spirit which inspires Christians to take up the work of the church, alone can bring about the desired change through the individual members of the church. But by examples each individual can bring the prodigals back to the fold and make the world more moral. All the civilization and culture in the world cannot make one virtuous man."

THE CONVERTING SPIRIT

Picking the Christian martyrs for an illustration Bishop Scannell continued: "The early martyrs gave up their lives willingly for their faith. This alone brought about Christianity and converted the pagan people to the church. They died for their church and pagans knew it must be true teachings of religion that prompted them to stand the tortures imposed upon them for their beliefs. It is the supernatural, the Holy Ghost, that makes true Christians attend church morning after morning and perform their religious duties, and not human efforts because they are the gospels of the Holy Ghost. The church goes on century after century without change and few are led astray from its teachings because the Holy Ghost dwells in the tabernacle on the altar and floods the souls of the people with love for their God and a firm belief in the gospels of their infallible leader."
