DANDELION PLAGUE IS PAST

Chief Dunn Discovers the Real Worth of the Yellow Beauty.

IS GREAT AID TO COMPLEXION

Women Now Dig Them by the Thousands and Are Seeing that None is Allowed to Escape.

Chief of Police Henry W. Dunn has found the only reliable, safe, sure way of eradicating the dandelion. He is giving his discovery to the public free and claims no credit for originality. "Just let the women know that there is nothing like dandelion greens for the complexion," he says. "Just let them know it. Keep telling them about it, and even high society will be on its knees digging dandelions to eat."

Chief Dunn called attention to his complexion. "Isn't it fine?" he said. "Just look at it. Dandelion greens did it. These greens are better when the plants are young, but they are good even after the plant has flowered. Of course they are bitter, but this bitterness is the real complexion maker."

"I understand French specialists and doctors of high reputation in the beauty world have recommended dandelion greens. I certainly recommend them. I have tried them and know. The women ought to be told about this, and the first thing we would know women of 50 to 70 years would have complexions like 15-year-olds."

Chief Dunn says all this campaigning to dig dandelions and pile them on vacant lots is not only a waste of energy, but reckless disregard of the medicinal value of the plant. If a man owns several million more dandelions than he can use in a season the chief recommends that they be canned for the winter. Other green things are preserved and the chief can see no reason why dandelion greens should be an exception to the rule.
